### The Beauty of Nature



Time sure has a way of escaping us. One minute it is January, and the next it is February. It, time, surely gives us pause to think about what was, and possibly anticipate what will be. I would venture a guess that no one really wants to remember yesterday and is fearful of tomorrow. Age, somehow, plays a significant role in our thinking.

The one thing that is constant, regardless of time, is that the seasons follow in accordance to the prescribed sequence. Actually time was once counted by the new moon and by the seasons. If you read history, especially Jewish history (Bible), you will find that celebrations, feasts, and commemorations were, and are, seasonal. The common denominator was, and is, the harvest times and the planting times. Two such holidays that come to mind are Sukkot and Shavuot.

In February there is another that is overlooked, but one that has a tremendous impact on our lives: Tu B'Shevat, the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. This specific date was chosen to commemorate nature and survival. It is the New Year of the trees. In Jewish tradition there are three other new year celebrations: Tishre, Rosh Hashanah, a dedication of our spiritual wellbeing, a new beginning to our lives; Passover, a testament to our understanding of our place in the universe and our impact on the awakening to a greater understanding of our relationship to each other and, of course, to God; the third is the first day of Elul, the beginning of our concentration on our obligations as humans dedicated to self-evaluation.

Why a New Year for trees? The simple truth is that it is a time set aside to renew our relationship with nature, to commemorate the bond that is necessary for our survival. It is a time when people and nature work together to make life livable and rewarding. The same holds true with our relationships with one another, whether family, friends, or sweethearts. And there are those of us who have lost loved ones and somehow this season allows us to remember that as nature is renewed with the seasons, so are our memories.

One day we wrote a name of a loved one on the sands of time and then it was washed away. Some of us are forced to write a new name, and refresh the old one so

that the remembrance does not disappear. Just as the trees shed their leaves in the winter and sleep, we, too, seem to feel a certain despair and hopelessness. But then we remember that with spring comes new growth and new opportunities to renew our memories.

Winter passes and we understand that the tree, sometimes barren, but often blooming, represents us. It is the symbol of eternity and the opportunity to garner our strength to bring renewal to our existence after the long sleep. It is a reminder that nothing is lost, and nothing is gone. When we see the flowers bloom and the trees bring forth their fruit, we should understand that life is never ending.

This is why we celebrate a holiday commemorating trees because it teaches us that we are the living embodiment of the connection to everything there is and everything that will be. It is a holiday that helps us understand the beauty of life, even as we are saddened by the losses we encounter. It is a holiday that gives expression to love with every leaf that blossoms and every bud that blooms.

To me, the poetess, Joyce Kilmer gave meaning to our love of nature and our awareness of the significance of trees:

#### **TREES**

By Joyce Kilmer

I think that I shall never see A poem lovely as a tree.

A tree whose hungry mouth is prest Against the earth's sweet flowing breast;

A tree that looks at God all day, And lifts her leafy arms to pray;

A tree that may in Summer wear A nest of robins in her hair:

Upon whose bosom snow has lain; Who intimately lives with rain.

Poems are made by fools like me, But only God can make a tree.

Perhaps you will want to plant a tree!



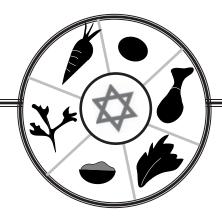



She currently serves as a member on Congressman Ruben Gallego's Veterans Council. Michelle understands the needs of the men and women who have served our country bravely and with honor. She oversees the fiscal and program operations of the U.S. Vets-Phoenix. Since its inception in 2001, the organization has given homeless and at-risk veterans in Maricopa County an opportunity to reclaim their lives and achieve selfsufficiency. In line with this, Michelle is a member of the Arizona Coalition to End Homelessness Legislative Advocacy. Annually, U.S. VETS-Phoenix provides housing to over 500 veterans in Maricopa County.



According to Michelle, "Since 2008, Jewish War Veterans Post 619 has donated \$42,600 to U.S.VETS-Phoenix, which is amazing! We never get enough funding. When we needed beds and dressers last year, I had no idea where we would get the money. JWV Post 619 came to our rescue. You guys are always wonderful to us."
