# RABBI IRWIN WIENER, D.D.



## Haman Is Alive and Well!

Yes. Haman is alive and well and still in Persia (Iran). His sons are also doing well (the Mulahs). And the destruction of the lews is still at the top of the list. Here it is Purim, and we are faced with the same tragic events that gave us the celebration of

this holiday. History is repeating itself even after 2500 years. It is like being brought back in time. The place is the same, the players the same, the intention the same. Will the results be the same? Where is Esther when you need her? Where is Mordecai?

Again, and again the platform of the United Nations, the place designated to bring order out of chaos, is desecrated. Civilization seems to have been put to sleep. Men and women dressed in suits and ties and skirts and dresses stand to applaud death and destruction.

I am reminded of Psalm eighty-three: "O God, keep not your silence; Hold not your peace, and be not still, O God. For lo, your enemies are in an uproar; and they that hate you have lifted up their head. They hold crafty converse against your people and take counsel against your treasured ones. They have said: 'Come and let us cut them off from being a nation; that the name of Israel may be no more in remembrance." On and on the Psalmist decries the torturous torment of the lewish people.

We seem to be helpless drifters in a world of hate and indifference. Our path is strewn with mistrust and anger. Our homes feel like prisons because we fear to move in circles where we once felt secure. We are expected to negotiate with barbarians and compromise and relent. The world sits on the edge of its seat waiting for signs and wonders from people with no such designs.

Israel teeters on the brink of annihilation expecting a miracle to deliver it from the sword of Haman. Hundreds of thousands were displaced when indiscriminate rockets were sent into its cities. Thousands died either on the battlefield or in their back yards, which are also battlefields because civilian life is no concern of murderers. We send leaflets to warn people of impending disaster and it is greeted with killing fields of children and women and the aged.

The whole world is embarked on a perilous journey. Do we stand and fight or run and hide? Do we allow ourselves to be intimidated by threats and sacrifice our hard-won freedoms by giving in to acts of cowardice that cause us to change our understanding of life? There is no place to hide, no place secure, no place unreachable by those who would destroy the very fabric of human endeavors.

When will we learn that only by the strength of our convictions can we ever hope to maintain the dignity we fought so hard to secure? Must we always repeat the mistakes of the past to ensure the future? The world is so small. We are all connected in some way to each other. Oceans don't separate us. Languages don't inhibit us. Cultures are thrown together and must learn to live in the framework of togetherness.

I am also reminded of an essay written by Pastor Neimoller during World War Two: "First, they came for the Communists, and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a Communist. Then they came for the Jews, and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a lew. Then they came for the Catholics, and I didn't speak up because I was Protestant. Then they came for me, and by that time there was no one left to speak up for me."

What does it take to make us realize that an act against one is an act against all?

And what of God's silence? Isaiah answered that question most eloquently: "For as the Heavens are higher than the Earth, so are My ways higher than your ways and My thoughts higher than your thoughts." We can sit and judge but what are we judging? The answer to God's silence is in our silence and inaction. God is not silent – we are deaf. Faith does not require an understanding but rather our participation in what was ordained from the beginning: To live together, to work together, to be strong together, to act together. Maybe then we can eliminate the evil that confronts us.

And perhaps as Psalm eighty-three ends, we too will understand: "That they may know that it is You alone whose name is the Lord, the Most High over all the earth."

Haman may be alive and well, but his fate is written in sacred texts.



### LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

#### BY THE NUMBERS IN 2024 - THE MICHAEL LEVIN MEMORIAL LONE SOLDIER CENTER



The East Valley JCC contributes to Shabbat and holiday observance and meals at the Center. We are proud of the role we play in this massive effort to support Lone Soldiers during wartime! Want to help? Call Michael at (480) 895-4660.

Here's what has been accomplished:

#### Community

- Opened a new center in Tel Aviv, conveniently located near the train station and Azrieli Towers.
- Hosted over 1,500 soldiers at our events throughout the year.
- Served more than 30,000 warm meals during Shabbat and the holidays.

#### **Counseling & Support**

- Welcomed 460 new soldiers, including Olim (new immigrants) and Israeli-born individuals.
- Managed 1,183 cases a 30% increase compared to 2023.
- Facilitated extended psychological treatment for 40 soldiers.
- Provided over 80,000 shekels in financial assistance to active and veteran soldiers.
- Awarded 21 educational scholarships.
- Distributed 7,000 items of personal equipment, including warm clothing, hygiene kits, first aid kits, and backpacks.
- Issued 200 gift cards (valued at over 70,000 shekels) for Rosh Hashanah meals.

#### Housing

- Provided six Lone Soldier Center houses that provide housing for 116 soldiers.
- Upgraded facilities with new furniture, air conditioners, and improved showers.
- Awarded over 60 scholarships to reserve soldiers to assist with living expenses


#### Literary Ladies Book Group

#### Food Drive


The third Wednesday between 11 am and 1 pm we collect non-perishable food for IFCS (Jewish Family & Children's Services) in various communities in the East Valley.

The dates and movies vary each month, but include a discussion of the film at lunch following the film.



## JEWISH WAR VETERANS COPPER STATE POST 619

### JDR JULIAN WYATT, RETIRED COMBAT VETERAN, TO SPEAK AT IWV INSTALLATION LUNCHEON

Dr. Julian Wyatt, Retired Navy Lieutenant Commander and author of "Becoming Jewish," will be the featured speaker at the Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 Installation Luncheon on Sunday, March 16. This event, chaired by Bety Dar, will take place in the new Oakwood Country Club Recreation Center, (formerly Poolside), 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd. in Sun Lakes.

The 2025-2026 Board will be installed, and members will be honored. Doors open at 11:30 am with a seated hot lunch served beginning at 12, noon.

The featured speaker is newly elected Post 619 Commander Julian Wyatt, a native of Worcester, Massachusetts. He served 30 years in the United States Navy from 1980 – 2010. His highest military award was the Bronze Star, from his combat tour in Iraq, 2007-2008.

"After formal education at a parochial school, I became a nomad and studied various faiths and traditions. I fell in love with the self-help teachings of Mussar (Jewish practice of moral conduct, instruction, or discipline) and the Kabbalah. That's where everything began," explains Julian.

Jules, as he prefers to be addressed, sought out a local synagogue after visiting Haifa, Israel in 1979. He became a Jew by choice in 2007 and a Bar Mitzvah in 2010. His vision quest is described in his book Becoming Jewish, which is available on Amazon.com.

Jules will speak about his 30 years in the U. S. Navy, and how both his military and civilian colleagues embraced him with open arms when he became Jewish. Oftentimes, he was the senior lewish person at a duty station or ship and became the Jewish Lay Leader. "Basically, I held all worship services and worked closely with our chaplains

for emergencies and deaths," explains Jules. During his last few months in the International Combat Zone, Jules describes his service as the Lay Leader for B'nai Baghdad, as the duty, honor, and privilege of a lifetime.

Back home in 2016, Jules began the Prison Yoga Project Phoenix Detachment as a way of helping to reduce recidivism and give incarcerated people tools of yoga and meditation to navigate stress, anxiety and depression. He currently works for a nonprofit called Mindfulness First, in Scottsdale, AZ. The organization goes into schools and teaches mindfulness to children and staff in K-12 schools. Also, as a certified health and life coach, this multitalented man helps veterans and their families with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and reintegration back into civilian life. "I believe strongly that if you have a gift, you must find a way to serve others. Every day I live Tikkun Olam (the Jewish concept of 'repairing the world')," claims Jules proudly.

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
