The Continuation of a Dream

If we look in Webster's Dictionary, we will find that the word "perpetuation" means everlasting. Also found is the meaning of continuation, or carrying on. Both of these words help us understand the value of tradition and

continuity. Our lives are wound around the need for the survival of our legacies and the impact we have on those we love and even those we meet on our journey.

This is what Chanukah is all about: Perpetuation and Continuity. We remember each year the struggle that brought us salvation and redemption. A small band of zealots determined that the survival of our Jewish heritage depended upon the shoulders of a few. The lights that are lit are a reminder that faith and tradition can only be extinguished if we allow the flames from our menorahs to diminish.

Chanukah teaches that there are things in this world that are worthy of our efforts. Chanukah teaches that these efforts may require extraordinary strength and endurance. Chanukah teaches that without faith, there can be no fulfillment and meaning in our lives.

Each year we commemorate those we wish to remember with special prayers designed to help us realize that their lives gave us purpose. Four times a year we offer special prayers enabling us to understand that without memory we cannot forge a future. We even light a candle during these times to remind us that the flame of their existence still burns within us and can never be extinguished as long as we remember. This is another lesson that Chanukah brings to the forefront of our existence.

As we enter the Chapel to attend services or other celebrations and sorrows, we are reminded of the past, because on the walls of this building — dedicated to the betterment of humanity through our deeds and prayers — we find the names of those who preceded

us and left an indelible mark on our journey. Their memories remind us of our devotion to the cause of human dignity. This too is another lesson of Chanukah — dignity and remembrance. In the past, if you will remember, we would carry a transportable board to each service until we realized that permanence gave our loved one's immortality.

While our Chapel may be a temporary place for our assembly, shared with other congregations, we still know that this is our spiritual home and we feel a sense of reverence each and every time we enter to connect with each other and with God. Here, too, we learn a valuable understanding of reverence and connection as demonstrated by a holiday called Chanukah.

Where exactly does our responsibility lie for our spiritual home's endurance and stability? Each congregation that calls this Chapel of Sun Lakes its home shares in ensuring that this symbol of faith remains in perpetuity. How do we do this? Simply by maintaining our relationship with our congregation and supporting all its efforts in sustaining a viable religious experience open to all.

For example, we have undertaken the task of establishing the Marty Silverman Memorial Fund with the express purpose of maintaining that which we have and guaranteeing that those who travel to our oasis in the desert will feel welcome and at home. Now, the next episode in this noble venture rests with each of us. Let us join together to extend ourselves so that we will always remember the man we honor, the memories we cherish, the faith we cling to in both sad and exciting times.

Nothing more should be necessary to be said. Much more certainly needs to be done. It is up to us to let the beacon of our lamp of life remain glowing because it is the only light of our faith in Sun Lakes. And what better time to ensure that the candles of our faith will never be extinguished? Chanukah. 🕯️


LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

CO-PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

During the Annual Meeting on Zoom on November 10, we were delighted with the pleasure that most congregants had when the business part of the meeting was concluded and folks just enjoyed visiting with one another and catching up online. At the following Board of Directors' (BOD) meeting, in which our newly elected BOD members participated, there were several suggestions of ways that we might follow up and develop social contact via Zoom. Ideas such as game nights, interest group discussions, and open chats with other congregants came up. We're looking into purchasing a Zoom account for general SLJC use instead of relying on the goodness of a few people who have private access to an account. When that happens, we'll try to be inventive and plan a few activities as trial runs. If you have any ideas or personal experience with hosting game nights or anything else like that, please feel free to let us know.

Besides discussing fun topics, the BOD also decided it would be very helpful for all congregants to know the purpose of our specific funds. Some, like the Oneg Fund, the Flower Fund, and the Music Fund are pretty self-explanatory. When donations come in for those funds, they are used to pay expenses related to those functions. In this time of quarantining, we have not needed to order flowers for the bima or pay for food for the Onegs. The Music Fund provides support for the cost of reproducing music for the choir or cantor as well as paying for musical guests, such as the cellist for Kol Nidrei.

However, we also have the Chapel Fund, and the Torah and Family Funds. Donations specified for the Chapel Fund help defray our monthly costs for Chapel and Chapel House use, as part of our obligation to the Chapel Board, which manages both. The Torah and Family Funds have recently been combined since we do not currently have a need to purchase a new Torah. But the Family Fund is not at all dormant. It is used to help underwrite the handful of SLJC members who cannot afford the dues or attend specific events such as the Passover Seder or the Break-the-Fast. When you contribute to that fund, you are providing a special mitzvah.

Finally, we have the Yahrzeit Fund and the **Marty Silverman Memorial Fund**. When you receive a letter reminding you of the yahrzeit of a loved one, many of you choose to make a donation to the temple in that loved one's memory. It is traditional to perform an act of tzedakah on the occasion of a yahrzeit, and many of you have responded regularly.

The Marty Silverman Memorial Fund is our newest fund, one that we hope to perpetuate for years to come. It was created to honor the memory of one of the most ardent developers of Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation who had an undying hope and devotion to the idea of continuing a Jewish presence here in Sun Lakes. 

Our monthly food drive will be held on Wednesday, December 16.



Tuesday, December 8, 1 p.m.



SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

Across America on Sunday evening, September 27, millions turned to NBC on their television sets to watch Sunday Night Football (SNF). When the broadcast started, many viewers recognized that the voice of play-by-play announcer **Al Michaels** was not present. Some thought that perhaps he had tested positive for the COVID-19 virus, while others could not imagine why he was not broadcasting the game.

The reason for Al's absence from SNF was the same as why Sandy Koufax did not start a World Series game decades ago. Al Michaels is Jewish, and September 27 was Erev Yom Kippur. Al Michaels was born to Jewish parents in Brooklyn, and moved with his family to Los Angeles in 1958. That was the same year that Al's favorite team, the Dodgers, moved from Brooklyn to Los Angeles.


Al went to Arizona State University, majoring in broadcasting, and getting his start announcing football, basketball and baseball games for ASU's on-campus radio station. His first job after graduation was interviewing women who wanted to be contestants on "The Dating Game." He quickly went back to sports-casting, and has become a well-respected announcer, who has been present at many great moments in the

sporting world. Most famous is his call at the semi-final ice hockey match at the 1980 Winter Olympics, where the U.S. defeated the Soviet team – "Do you believe in miracles?"

Al and his wife, Linda, have been married for 54 years and still reside in Los Angeles. They have two adult children. No, he did not change his name; he was born to Jay and Lila Michaels.


