LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

ISRAEL'S WAR WITH HAMAS LEADS TO FOCUS ON LONE SOLDIERS

As the barbaric massacre by Hamas on October 7th killed 1200 Israelis and wounded many more, the Lone Soldier Project's annual Hanukkah Greeting Campaign was underway. An intense interest and concern by North American lews and non-lews led many to seek ways to support Israel and the IDF.

The usual Hanukkah focus of the campaign was expanded to include concern about the welfare of soldiers and particularly the accentuated needs of Lone Soldiers as a result of the necessary war against Hamas.

Donations totalling almost \$8,000 were received, including a grant from Jewish War Veterans Post 619 and from Adam Woldoff as part of his Mitzvah Project for his Bar Mitzvah at Temple Beth El. We were able to send emergency donations to our three Lone Soldier Centers partners in Israel to support the necessary services required by the war.

Cards and letters were received from religious schools at 14 congregations in Arizona, with additional requests to participate from Bloomfield, New Jersey; Manchester and South Windsor Connecticut; Lexington, Massachusetts; Cossack, New York; and Augusta, Georgia. Madalyn Gressel joined Adam Woldoff for a Mitzvah Project at Temple Solel.

Three new adult organization provided messages: Mitzvah Mavens of Brandeis National Committee, Shalom Circle residents at The Palazzo in Phoenix, and the Shalom Club at Leisure World in Mesa. Lone Soldiers will benefit significantly by everyone's interest and effort. We are doing our share to support Israel as this horrible crisis plays out and is hopefully resolved.

WELCOMES ALMA HERNANDEZ, ARIZONA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Our guest lecturer, Alma Hernandez, will speak on her experiences as a Jewish Mexican American and being the youngest woman ever elected to the Arizona House. She is an ardent supporter of Israel, having visited the Jewish homeland on several occasions. She will also address the official and unofficial support for Arizona within the state government.

Alma has a BA and MA in Public Health from University of Arizona. Before her five years in government, she worked at the Jewish Federation of Southern Arizona. Her bill, HR 2241 requiring mandatory high school education on the Holocaust, was passed in 2021.

Forward Magazine named Alma Hernandez one of the 50 Most Influential Jews, while Algemeiner.com named her one of the top 100 People Positively Influencing Jewish Life.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

LINDA G. MILLS By Murray Siegel

New York University has been around since 1831, opened under the leadership of Albert Gallatin, Secretary of the Treasury under Presidents Jefferson and Madison. The University made history in 2023. It was announced that the next President of NYU is Dr. Linda G. Mills, who is not only the first female to lead NYU, but she is the first lewish president of the college. (I must mention that NYU is my alma mater). Dr. Mills had a great-grandmother who was murdered in the Holocaust and had a grandfather who escaped the Nazis and immigrated to the U.S.

Dr. Mills has a Ph.D. in Health Policy from Brandeis University and a J.D. from the University of California College of Law in San Francisco (also known as Hastings). She has been the Lisa Ellen Goldberg Professor of Social Work, Public Policy, and Law, and the Executive Director of the NYU Center on Violence and Recovery. She first came to NYU as an associate professor of Social Work in 1999 and in 2001 was promoted to full professor.



Her principal areas of scholarly focus are trauma, bias, and domestic violence; her research, funded by the National Science Foundation and the National Institute of Justice, has reshaped the field of treatment in domestic violence and her restorative justice-based programs are currently being adopted in several jurisdictions across the U.S.




SLJC SISTERHOOD



General Hadassah Meeting


