CO-PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

This month our column will be a little bit of everything, like what we take from the Thanksgiving table. Hopefully our taste buds will be satisfied as we begin what is the first of the secular holidays.

First of all, we will hold our Annual Congregational Meeting on Tuesday, November 16th at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom. You will all receive an invitation later this month. We will elect new Board of Directors members, review our finances based on the last fiscal year (2020-21), and discuss the challenges we face ahead. Please read the bios of the nominated members of the BOD in the October issue of the *Shpiel*.

Also, please join us for our November Shabbat service on Friday, November 12, when we will be honoring our new SLJC members. If you find you're sitting near a newcomer, please take a moment to introduce yourself and welcome him/her. Our 18th new member (whose name was inadvertently omitted last month) is Jeff Stein.

Second, to follow up on last month's column, the Finance Committee has recommended that SLJC retain at least one year's operating capital in our Reserve Fund, with the hope that we will replenish our reserves (including the Marty Silverman Memorial Campaign) by 10% each year. The BOD has approved this recommendation. This will be a tall order, and it is completely dependent on our retaining or even exceeding our membership goals each year and on the generosity of all of us to continue to dig deep and make meaningful contributions to the temple each year.

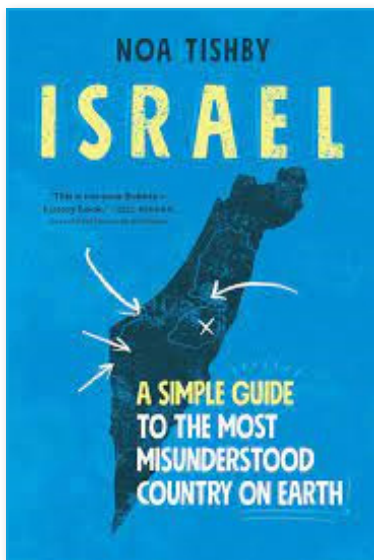
The Finance Committee also recommended, and the BOD approved, starting a new fund in addition to those already existing. This new fund would be our Technology Fund, with the hope that all contributions to this fund would finance and sustain the technology expenses we now require in order to continue to serve

the congregation. It is our hope that we will be able to offer live stream services on a permanent basis and offer more and more of our Adult Education programs either live streamed or on Zoom. Due to staffing, technical, and licensing costs, our expenses increase to meet these needs.

We know that many of you find it harder and harder to drive to a central spot for programming and we want to continue to expand our outreach to our entire congregation. For instance, we know that residents of Robson Reserve (formerly known as Renaissance) gather in a common room to watch our monthly Shabbat services. We've been told the residents feel like an extension of the congregation and may be able to watch the services at a more convenient time for them. In this way, we are fulfilling one of our basic values: perpetuating the connection of Jewry and particularly Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation in our area.

Finally, we are so pleased to announce that our quest for a new SLJC president has been fulfilled. Shelly Henden has accepted for her return engagement! As we all know, Shelly is a former SLJC president and was excellent as a leader. It will be delightful to have her again holding the reins. The BOD, as mentioned in earlier articles, will continue to support and manage various necessary temple functions. Shelly asks that you contact her at 480-895-8851 if you would like to participate in upcoming services (for candle lighting, ark openings, aliyot, or readings). Also, we need more volunteers (men or women) for *gabbaim*. Knowledge of Hebrew is not required, and Michael Cohen will happily train you. The only requirement is to be able to lift the Torah.

Now we have come full circle—back to our Annual Meeting and our Thanksgiving smorgasbord. Even with upheaval, we all have so much to be grateful for. May you all enjoy a peaceful and satisfying holiday. 🕯️



FRIENDS OF ISRAEL BOOK REVIEW

Israel: A Simple Guide to the Most Misunderstood Country on Earth, by Noah Tishby

Noah Tishby is an Israeli actress who starred in the nation's highest rated TV drama and then moved to LA to pursue her acting. She has since co-produced 150 episodes of "In Treatment" on HBO. When she began talking to Americans about Israel, she realized "Israel has a massive PR problem" and "what was common knowledge to me was total news to everyone else." She became an activist for American-Israeli relations, and after several years of research wrote this book.

This book is entertaining, very readable, factual and full of valuable information that assists in understanding present day Israel. Tishby is a professed left-leaning liberal, and discusses her multigenerational family history as she weaves the history of Zionism and Israel. Much of what she says is contrary to what you have heard or read in U.S. media, and is more accurate.

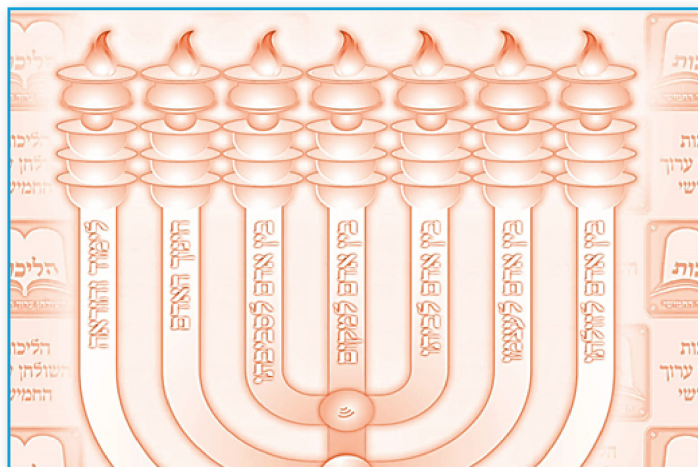

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

EVJCC 2021 HANUKKAH GREETINGS CAMPAIGN

There are 7,000 lone soldiers from Israel and 80 countries around the world that have one thing in common — they do not have immediate family in Israel to help meet their needs while they are serving in the Israel Defense Forces. These courageous and dedicated young adults are committed to the demanding task of defending the Jewish Homeland. Their lack of family support creates loneliness, especially since most Israelis on active duty with families go home frequently while on active duty.

Lone Soldier Centers have been created to serve as a "home away from home" with religious, social, recreational and counseling support as well as a place to "hang out". The Lone Soldier Project of the East Valley JCC partners with three of these centers by donating money for Shabbat and holiday meals, sending knitted hats for winter assignments and sending letters and cards at Hanukkah time to enhance the holiday experience for the soldiers. Expressions of appreciation and awareness of the important role they play in sustaining the Jewish Homeland are most meaningful to them. These greetings really bolster their emotional and physical energy in order to help them meet the demands of serving in the IDF.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

ELISSA SLOTKIN

Are you familiar with Elissa Slotkin? If not, you should read what she has written and hear what she has said; she is a very interesting person. Elissa was born to Jewish parents in NYC six days after Bicentennial Day and grew up on a farm in Holly, Michigan. Her family owned Hygrade Meat Co., manufacturers of Ball Park Franks.

She has a bachelor's degree from Cornell, and a master's degree from Columbia. Elissa is fluent in Arabic and Swahili, and was recruited by the CIA as an intelligence analyst. She served three tours in Iraq, where she met her husband, Dave Moore, an Apache helicopter pilot, who is now a retired Army colonel. She was in Iraq for our withdrawal and for the return of the U.S. military to subdue ISIS.

She joined the Department of Defense as acting assistant secretary for international security from 2015 to 2017. In 2017, she decided to challenge the incumbent Republican Congressman for the eighth Michigan district. The district had voted for Mitt Romney in 2012 and Donald Trump in 2016, yet she won the seat. In 2020,



her constituents voted to re-elect President Trump, yet voted for her re-election despite the fact that she voted FOR the president's impeachment.

She is a pragmatic problem solver and has no problem working with folks on the other side of the aisle. She states that she will not vote for a bill until she has read it, which is refreshing. If there is to be a Jewish U.S. president in the future, Elissa Slotkin just might be the one. 🇮🇸

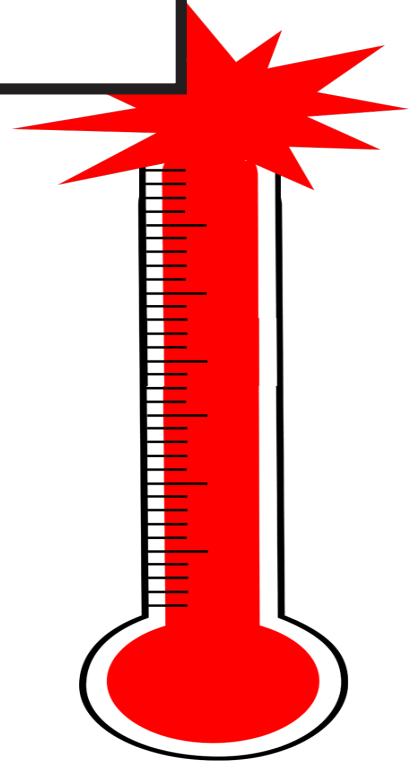

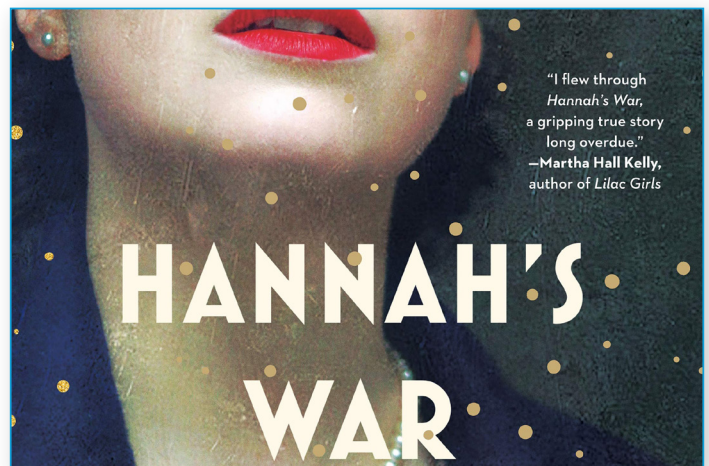
Devorah will have a **Board meeting on Sunday, November 7 at 10:30 on Zoom.**

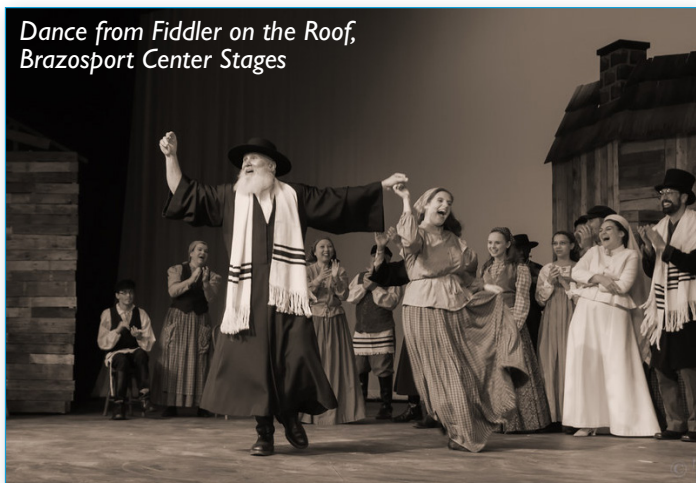
A MUSIC PROGRAM

On Friday, November 19 at 5 pm, Cantor Ronda Polesky and Shea Marshall will present **100 years of Jewish Broadway**. We will review and present musical selections from as early as 1919 with the musical *Sinbad*, by George and Ira Gershwin. The American Yiddish theater is linked as the inspiration for the Broadway musical.

From its inception, musical theater has been intertwined with Jewish influence. What many cantors refer to as “Torah minor” to describe the mode of chanting represented by the blessings we say when reading the Torah is clearly the influence for the riff from *Porgy and Bess* in *It Ain't Necessarily So*. There are numerous other examples throughout early Broadway history where liturgical and Yiddish melodies influenced Broadway compositions.
