Duty - Honor - Country | 11/11/2023

At precisely 11 am on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, in the year 1918, the "war to end all wars" concluded. If the people who experienced the nightmare known as World War II are spoken of as the "Greatest Generation." then I submit

to you that the wave of humanity fighting in World War I should be called the "Naive Generation."

There was no glory to speak of, only the gory mess of millions dead and millions more maimed, their lives forever destroyed. The only thing that came out of that horrific episode in humanity's quest to kill were seeds that involved us in the next encounter. There have been so many it's hard to count and even remember.

Wars have been with us since time immemorial. When we do not understand someone or do not like the color of a person's skin or the tone in a voice or thoughts spoken, we take up arms to destroy that which is different. However, do not forget that most wars are fought because of economics.

As Americans, we know very well what that means. We have visited the shadow of death in a Revolution, a Civil War. Some of us have been victims of discrimination in the workplace, in schools, in the arts. Yet, Americans have contributed immeasurably to the betterment of society - the betterment of the human experience because of a secret ingredient called liberty.

Our ancestors found a haven on these shores. It was not an easy journey. We arrived here from distant lands where we felt the wrath of indifference and contempt. We have been tested repeatedly. The immigrants who travelled great distances to enjoy the smell of freedom and contentment struggled, but through it all we understood that anything worth having is worth the sacrifice necessary to achieve it.

Each generation of Americans answered the call of their country because we knew, as Jeremiah instructed us, "Seek the welfare of the land... and pray to the Lord on this land's behalf; for in its welfare shall you find your welfare." (Jeremiah 29:7) Yes, we even took up arms to ensure this freedom and security for all the people of this great land. And we fought and continue to fight for freedom for everyone. We were not born soldiers - we were farmers or tailors or musicians or laborers trying to earn a living to support our families and bring those less fortunate to be with us as we began a new life in a new land.

We became soldiers, airmen, sailors, and marines. We fought and some died and some of us were injured beyond repair – but we came to the aid of our America. We can and should be proud of our contribution to liberty and equality for all. Every American fought side by side. We cheered when the brave came home from battle as we thanked God for our survival as well. We danced in the streets when wars ended because we loved our liberty. Those around the world who hate us never understood that.

We honor all who served and continue to serve because it is the right thing to commemorate the sacrifices made guaranteeing freedom for the generations that follow as was done for us. Each generation takes that responsibility upon itself.

We should always pray that the dreams that brought us to this day should always be remembered. May those who continue to be in harm's way find their way back in safety and may we never lose sight of the sacrifice for Duty, Honor and Country. That is what it means to be an American.

I hope everyone will join us at our Sabbath Service on Friday, November 10 at 7 pm when we will honor all veterans with Capitol Post #619 joining with us to pay tribute to all who served.

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

SUPPORT FOR IDF SOLDIERS

Lone Soldiers in the IDF are in the midst of extreme tension in Israel. Lone Soldiers face many obstacles as they serve including language issues, cultural adaptation, understanding IDF procedures, not being connected to young adult religious or recreational activities, stress related to the extreme demands of IDF service, homesickness, loneliness when Israel soldiers go home for Shabbat and holidays and at times anxiety and depression.

The current tensions in Israel expand the demands and therefore stress within the IDF. Internally, deaths from Palestinian terrorists, from the IDF attempting to keep Israel secure, from extreme lewish attacks against Arabs, and within the Israeli Arab community are at an all-time high. Externally, Iran threatens Israel on a daily basis with Iran-driven Hezbollah from Jordan on the Israeli border and the Islamic lihad in Gaza and the West Bank. Hamas is weaponized by Iran, and the Palestinian Authority refuses to police the Israeli-hostile communities as is their responsibility. Divisive politics have caused huge demonstrations requiring IDF involvement.

The typical stresses for Lone Soldiers are currently escalated based on these realistic daily threats demanding IDF attention. This daily risk and stress enhances our need to support them.



Also, the Lone Soldier Project's Annual Hanukkah Greeting Campaign has begun, and I would like to offer you two electronic options to participate (see below). The holidays are the loneliest time of the year for the Lone Soldiers, who come from 80 countries around the world and from Israel. The Israeli Lone Soldiers do not have a welcoming home to receive them during the holidays.

Dear Soldier, thank you thank you so much for protecting Israel and it's people. You may sit one day and think, I can't do this anymore, but I hope you know how much it means to us that you all putting your life on the line to protect our friends. We think of and honor you for your work all the Way from Arizona. Thank you again 1 Sincerely,

Our Annual Hanukkah Greeting Campaign is a great way to communicate our concern and support for Lone Soldiers. When they receive our letters and cards, they realize that they are doing something far greater than themselves. They are defending the Jewish homeland for Jews all over the world and are appreciated for their courage and commitment. IWV SPEAKER DESCRIBES HOW VETERANS CAN ACCESS A MYRIAD OF FREE SERVICES

lewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 (IWV) will welcome Dana West, Central Arizona Outreach Coordinator for the Arizona Department of Veterans' Services (ADVS), as its Sunday, November 19, featured speaker. The meeting takes place in the Poolside building at Oakwood Country Club, 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd. in Sun Lakes. A "Meet & Greet," with FREE lox and bagels, coffee, and doughnuts starts at 9:30 am. The speaker follows at 10 am. All are welcome.

The ADVS mission is to remove barriers to the resources and benefits veterans have earned. By calling their Veterans' Benefits Counselors (VBC) scheduling line, (602) 535-1215, counselors educate veterans about the benefits available in the state of Arizona. Veterans can receive assistance with applying for such services as service-connected disability claims, nonservice-connected pensions, burial, and survivor benefits.

Ms. West, an Army veteran herself, has been Outreach Coordinator for Arizona Department of Veterans Services (ADVS) since last year. Here, she spends her time raising awareness about the programs and services offered to veterans and their families by attending events and doing presentations in the community.

"Recently, as a team, we were able to assist a combat veteran who was experiencing homelessness," Ms. West relayed sympathetically. "He had completed the PTSD Foundation of America's intensive residential program at Camp Hope, which aims to provide comprehensive peer support

and mentoring based healing for veterans. The veteran was offered a job with PTSD Foundation after completing the program but needed assistance finding and obtaining housing. I was able to connect him to our Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF) team, who assisted him with applying," continued West. The veteran was approved and was able to get assistance paying past due bills, move-in fees, deposits, and a few months' rent. "I am honored we were able to connect him to a resource that not only helped but gave him the ability to get on his feet and thrive," added West.

A Thanksgiving Message

Thursday, November 24, each of us will gather again in various locations for the annual Thanksgiving celebration. Each family will sit around the table and talk about the gratefulness that we all feel in our hearts.

Perhaps we should remember the date of November 26, 1789, when President George Washington issued a proclamation through a resolution from Congress: "A day of public thanksgiving and prayer devoted to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be."

In setting aside this day of Thanksgiving, a truly American holiday was established setting a non- sectarian tone for all to participate in without fear or reservation. While a hallmark of our Constitution is the separation of church and state, it is still true that we, as a nation, have a strong regard for sacred practices and beliefs.

Also contained in this proclamation were the following words: "And also that we may then Unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and a Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative Duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws..."

Perhaps it would do us well, given all we have endured, to pray as well for the Nation to once again heal and come together as we have done so many times before. Let us always remember to continually ask God to bless these United States.

Thanksgiving should remind us of this and more.
