RABBI IRWIN WIENER



Shavuot — Its name derives from the fact that this primarily agricultural holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. Traditionally it marked the beginning of the wheat harvest. The ceremony surrounding its importance can be

found in the Talmud, and includes a beautiful ceremony of song and merriment as people gathered in the Temple to offer thanks to God for the abundance of the harvest.

As I have mentioned numerous times, the Israelites were required to make a pilgrimage to the Temple three times a year — Shavuot, Sukkot and Passover (Pesach). Each journey symbolized the feelings of gratitude and appreciation for the blessings of life during the various episodes of life's voyage.

Shavuot also commemorates the giving of the Commandments at the Mount. This significant moment in the life of the people also represented the understanding that life had meaning and purpose. It has been and remains a message for all people as it helps us realize that life has no value unless it contains discipline and connection — connection to each other and to God.

One tradition that relates to this holiday is that we do not eat any kind of meat. It is a reminder that all life is precious. We do not destroy to enjoy.

We also read from the Book of Ruth in which is described the essence of loyalty and devotion to family and faith. Ruth, after losing her husband, determines that her life has no purpose if not connected to his ancestors and faith. She joins her mother-in-law, Naomi, as they head back to their homeland and famously declares: "Whither thou goest I will go. Thy people will be my people, thy God my God." That is the beginning of her conversion into the faith of Judaism.

The Feast of Weeks: Shavuot

Ruth eventually marries Boaz and from that union King David was given to us. Thus begins the process of solidifying the Israelites into one nation.

Unfortunately, over time this holiday gets lost in the aftermath of Passover and the beginning of summer when things slow down, and the heat of the season keeps us closer to home.

At the Shabbat Service on Friday, May 14, we will read from the Book of Ruth, as is the custom.

This story emphasizes the importance of helping the unfortunate (as Ruth symbolized), and the opportunity to make known the value of a person's worth. Boaz rescues Ruth from poverty and through this gesture of kindness guarantees that their journey would remain an inspiration for all time. It is recited at the time of commemorating the giving of the Commandments to teach us that deeds sanctity life, as well as the words given by God. It is a classic tale of love and devotion and how these feelings weave themselves into our perception of life's blessings.

Such is the love that God has for us. 🚢

Vaccinate! Vaccinate! Vaccinate!

As optimism grows in our country about getting together and returning to something like normal, we, too, are planning for a reunification of our congregation. Obviously, the key is vaccination, wearing a mask, and social distancing if possible.

We are planning to "open up" for the July and August Twilight Services, July 9th and August 13th, both at 5:30. Usually the attendance is smaller because we have snowbirds who may not be here during the summer. (Also, many of you have borrowed prayerbooks; please remember to return them when you first attend services in person.) If all is well, we will be holding High Holiday services together at the Chapel as usual. Our choir will be back and Jan Semez, the wonderful cellist from the Phoenix Symphony, will be with us for Yom Kippur.

In June, you will receive a dues invoice along with the personal information we have in our database regarding your address, phone number, birthday, anniversary, and yahrzeits you observe. This will give you a chance to review and, if necessary, correct anything we may have that isn't right. There will also be information about ordering guest High Holiday tickets. Later in the summer you will receive your own High Holiday tickets along with any guest tickets you may have ordered, with the time of each service noted.

This year, Rabbi Wiener will also resume conducting the K'ver Avot service. Valley of the Sun is hosting the service for us; it is scheduled for Sunday, September 12th at 10:00 a.m. with a continental breakfast, and then the service beginning at 10:30.

The Board of Directors has also voted to reinstate the non-member plaque sale, offering you the opportunity to memorialize non-member loved ones at a cost of \$36 instead of the usual \$50 per name. The sale will be in effect until October 31st, but if you want to add a plaque please keep in mind that Rabbi Wiener consecrates the new plaques on Yom Kippur. Look for further information about this sale elsewhere in this Shpiel.

We hope you are well. Please be sure to get your vaccination before attending services. We will be requiring masks at Twilight Services, and for all future plans we will continue to follow the guidelines of the CDC and Dr. Fauci. Keep in mind that the Chapel is sanitized once a week.

In the meantime, please join us for our YouTube Shabbat service on May 14th and June 11th at the usual time of 7:00 p.m. Then, on Friday, June 25th, Rabbi Wiener and Cantor Polesky will hold a brief Twilight service as an extra treat on Zoom. You will be sent a link closer to that date. (Please note: there will not be a Twilight Service on the fourth Friday in May as previously announced due to the Memorial Day Weekend holiday.)

Stay healthy! We'll be seeing each other soon. 🚢


FRIENDS OF ISRAEL ISRAEL'S POPULATION PROJECTIONS

Israel's population is 9,227,700 inhabitants with 74.24% being Jewish, 20.95% being Arab of any religion other than Jewish, and 4.81% being "other" (may include those with Jewish ancestry but officially deemed not Jewish). Israel's 6.9 million Jews are part 14.8 million Jews worldwide with 83% living in the US or Israel. Among the Israeli Jews, the Haredi community was 12.9% of the total population in 2020. Life expectancy is 82.7 years (8th in the world).

Projections are that by 2059 there will be 18 million people in Israel, with 14.4 million Jews and 3.6 million Arabs. Haredis will be 27% of the total population by then. The fertility rate in Israel in 2020 was 3.0 children per woman. For the first time in 2018 the fertility rate of Israeli Jews exceeded that of their Arab peers. The Haredi birth rate is currently 6.7 per women but is expected to decline to 5.5 by 2025.

These statistics and birth rate projections make it highly probably that Jews will remain Israeli's majority and that Haredi social, political, religious influence will grow substantially.

Thinking of when we can get together again? For our first event, why not bring a single Jewish guest to join our fun in Havurah Chai!


Please note that when the Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation opens the temple doors for Shabbat

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

CARDINALS NUMBER 99

Recently the Arizona Cardinals signed J.J. Watt, one of the premier defensive players in the NFL. Watt wears #99 but that number had been "retired" by the Cardinals. To understand why that number was retired you must go back in time to when the Cardinals played in Chicago and they had a star running back named Marshall Goldberg.

Marshall was born to Jewish parents, Sol and Becky Goldberg, who ran a ladies' clothing store in the town of Elkins, West Virginia. Marshall was an outstanding athlete and was captain of the high school football, basketball and track teams. He went on to play at the University of Pittsburgh, where he was on the national championship teams in 1936 and 1937. Goldberg placed second in the 1938 Heisman Trophy voting (third place was also a Jewish player, Sid Luckman).

Marshall played for the NFL Cardinals from 1939 to 1948, with an interruption in 1944 and 1945 for service in the Pacific with the Navy. He was a four-time All Pro and the team became the NFL champion in 1947.



His uniform number was retired and was placed in the Cardinals' Ring of Honor. Going into business after football, Marshall ran a machine tool company in Illinois. He died in 2006 at the age of 88. This year, his daughter, Ellen Tullos, gave permission for the Cardinals to unretire jersey number 99 so that Watt could have that number.


