Hope and Faith

Faith and hope consist of many considerations. For example, there is the desire for a life of contentment and fulfillment. This is accomplished with faith in the future. Then there is the belief that doing good and acting kindly will find favor with God. We hope that the faith we have will enable us to realize

our dreams and aspirations.

Many tragedies occur in our lifetime. Sometimes we dwell on them more than the accomplishments we have achieved. We forget the creativity and exploration that gave us satisfaction. We sometimes achieve unimaginable heights in reaching for a life with meaning, but we also forget to appreciate what we have.

It reminds me of something I once read that deals with the effects of gratitude. It starts by talking about our parents, and how they attempt to teach us the path to independence. It explains how sometimes we are audacious and obnoxious, but we know that our parents will accept us with open arms ever forgiving. God, too, sees us succumbing to temptation and floundering with no purpose or destination. God sets a plan before us — a roadmap — and we choose to not follow knowing full well the consequences of our actions.

What does God do? God smiles and accepts the good with the bad and understands full well the gift of choice.

There is one thing missing however — gratitude. True, there are times when we do not feel so grateful. Still, just as we found our parents to be less than understanding at times, we were still grateful for their open arms, their unconditional love.

How about extending that to God a little. The reading I refer to goes even further. It talks about dreaming together. It then leads us into a dream of meeting an angel as we ascend the seven rungs on the ladder to eternity. The angel takes our hand and begins showing us around. This place, where prayers are delivered, was very busy with so many petitions from all over the world. They are then distributed to the various sections to be considered by the angel in charge of each section. And as the story continues, we learn that each section is referred to as a receiving section. All the requests are then sorted for distribution and eventually delivered to God. Sort of an Amazon distribution center where everything is sorted for delivery.

Finally, we arrive at a room at the end of the corridor and much to our surprise only one angel is there sitting idly doing nothing. This, we are told, is the *gratitude section*. Naturally, we are curious as to why it was not busy. The angel told us that after people receive the blessings they ask for, very few send back acknowledgments.

We then asked our guide as to how one acknowledges God's blessings. The answer was quite simple – "Just say thank you," was his reply. How many of us stop to say thank you to God? We complain to God, we blame God, we even deny God. For that matter, how many times do we say thank you to anyone who is kind to us, shows generosity or just befriends us?

How do we say thank you to God – think of all the people in the world who have no food, no shelter, not enough resources to make their lives livable. Think of all the people in the world who are ill with no hope for a recovery, imprisoned, lonely or maimed. Think of all the people in the world who cannot pray to their God without the fear of being murdered because of their practices or beliefs.

Then we should bow our heads and give thanks to a God who is here this very moment. On this day we should express our gratitude, this time for renewal – for that is the way to start a new day – grateful for the past and ever grateful that there is a tomorrow. It is not an easy road we travel, but if we say thank you enough maybe our attitude and the results of our positive responses will make all the difference in how we live our lives and at the same time extend them so that we can say thank you again the next day, and the next day, and, yes, the next day as well.

Is this not what the season that we are enjoying is all about? Oh — and thank you for reading this!

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT LONE SOLDIERS RECOGNIZED AS JEWS

According to the *Jerusalem Post* on March 3, 2023, Lone Soldiers realized their dreams of being officially recognized as Jews after completing a conversion ceremony at the Western Wall in Jerusalem and being called to read from the Torah. While all of them had Jewish ancestral histories, it was not adequate to be recognized as Jews in accordance with Halacha.

Maria Ratzitz, who serves with the Border Police, came to Israel in 2020 and recently completed her conversion studies, celebrated her Bat Mitzvah, and was feted with a special surprise. Her mother, whom she had not seen in more than a year, was brought to Israel from Russia for the occasion. The Big Brother Association for Lone Soldiers, which was founded by its CEO Daniel Aharon together with the Western Wall Heritage Foundation, organized the ceremony.




Bar Mitzvah Celebration at the Western Wall on March 3, 2023

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT TEACHER EDUCATION IN ISRAEL

Sunday, April 2, 3 pm, Chapel Center





The Teacher Education in Israel program is free and open to the entire community. Geoffrey John Kaye, an SLJC member, will discuss his role in developing the Kaye Academic College of Education in Beer Sheva, Israel. He will discuss how he got involved and how the school has grown and now flourishes. The college is now the hub of teacher training for the entire Negev with approximately 3500 students.

- The college population is socio-economically and ethnically diverse, including religious and secular Jews, Ethiopian and former Soviet Union immigrants, Bedouin (about 48% of all students), and Arab students.
- It features a Center for Motivation and Self-Determination, as well as a Multiculturalism Center.
- The school highlights education of democratic values; coexistence in a multicultural society; and communal, social, and civil activism and leadership.
- It is currently involved in two international collaborative projects funded by the European Union.
- The faculty has published a record 26 and 24 research papers in 2020 and 2021 respectively.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW JACKIE ROBINSON

On April 15, thousands of baseball fans will celebrate the anniversary of Jackie Robinson trotting out to take his position at first base at Ebbets Field, breaking the Major League Baseball (MLB) color line. What most folks might not know is the contribution to Robinson's success by a number of Jews.

There were two Jewish sports writers who pressed for baseball to end its segregation. They were Lester Rodney of *The Daily Worker*, and Shirley Povich, who wrote for *The Washington Post*. These two journalists consistently challenged MLB to allow stars of the Negro League to have a chance to utilize their athletic skills in the big leagues.

Isadore Muchnick was a Russian Jew who was a member of the Boston City Council. He arranged for Jackie to have a tryout with the Red Sox, which resulted in Branch Rickey discovering Robinson's talents and the eventual signing with the Dodgers.

Another Jewish sportswriter was Sam Maltin, a writer for the Montreal Herald, who charted Jackie's success in leading the Montreal Royals to the 1946 Minor League World Series victory. Once Jackie made his Major League debut, many players were hostile, but there were a few exceptions. Future Hall of Famer and the first MLB Jewish superstar, Hank Greenberg, offered positive advice to Robinson, and they became good friends.



In 1954, Jackie and his wife Rachel were looking to buy a home in Westchester County, but the homes they liked were taken off the market to avoid selling to a Black family. Andrea Simon (wife of Richard Simon of Simon & Schuster, and mother of Carly Simon) learned of the Robinson's difficulties and went house hunting with Rachel until she was able to buy a 12-room home on a five-acre property. So as Americans celebrate Jackie Robinson, they should be aware of the support provided by Jewish citizens of the U.S. and Canada.

HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE: A SACRED OBLIGATION

None of us will ever comprehend the horrific chapter in humanities history referred to as the Holocaust. Even those who lived through this nightmare cannot understand how human beings can be brought to such a level of monstrous proportions.

Each year we stand and remember those who have no candles lit for them on the anniversary of their death, or prayers recited as their names are not mentioned because no one really knows all the names. There are no monuments erected to mark the spot where once lived people who were sacrificed for the sake of hatred. Their unmarked graves bear witness to the disgrace that is the legacy of man's darkest hour. All of this happened because to be different in any way was the mortal sin of depravity.

The systematic degradation, dehumanization, and physical destruction are testaments to the evil that lurks inside the dark side of the human spirit. Humankind can sink to the depths of depravity when godliness is replaced by godlessness.

One and one half million little boys and girls, and over five million men and women — more than six million victims of the whim of monsters--are no more. "That little boy," wrote A.M. Klein, a German poet (1909-1972), "my cousin, whose cry might have been my cry in that dark land-where shall I seek you? On what wind shall I reach out to touch the ash that was your hand?"

Each of us, whether Jew or Gentile, is left to remind the world that this heinous act cannot and will not ever be repeated again. More than sixty million people from all walks of life and all corners of the globe were also sacrificed on the altar of indifference. That is why we should always and forever remember the blood-soaked earth, the stench from the ovens of mass destruction, and the cries of the helpless. Each time we remember, we resurrect a soul, which symbolizes the rebirth of values and benevolence and blessing.

In addition, Gary, a professional magician for twenty years, enjoys entertaining the vets and their children at JWV functions.


