Locked In

I am at a loss as to what I could possibly write that would have any impact at this moment in time. All of us are confined to our residences, for the most part. Occasionally, perhaps we venture out to purchase groceries, and then go right back

where we started from. We are "locked in" to the daily routine of waking, dressing, and then realizing we have nowhere to go. We look at the four walls in whatever room we find ourselves and wonder what it is like on the outside.

I believe we all feel this way. However, I would offer a suggestion or two that may relieve the boredom and even depression that sets in. Instead of feeling helpless, we can involve ourselves in things that will give us fulfillment. For example:

I. Pick up the phone, or access visual connections that will bring you closer to everyone you care about or are concerned about. Try it for one moment and I

believe you will find yourself traveling through space into the lives of others as they tune in to the ability of being there with you. At first it may seem bizarre, but after a few moments you will realize that all the feelings of loneliness have disappeared.

Soon the conversation will transport you into a feeling of being connected. It will feel as though you are right there reaching out to touch the ones who are important in your lives. No more feelings of loneliness or despair, just the joy of sharing precious moments and thoughts, and yes, laughter. It's like sitting in a movie theater watching a show with one exception: the people on the screen can talk to you and hear you, laugh with you, and exchange stories and experiences

that have just happened, or will happen. There are no time limits or restrictions. You can say anything and exchange stories of the present and the past. You can talk about what will be as this nightmare eases and things will return to some sort of normalcy.

2. Some of you may have patios. Some of you may live near parks. Perhaps arrangements can be made with small groups to gather, at a proper distance, and drink coffee or tea and just converse about this or that. It is a way of doing something different with others to feel the connection that is needed. We were not created to be alone. We need others to complete our feeling of value and purpose. Some of you may like jogging.

Some of you may like golfing. Some of you may enjoy watching the people who are active in these activities — not everyone can participate, some may rather be spectators. Regardless, the outside will give you a respite from the inside.

I guess what I am trying to say is that there is so much to life that needs to be explored even as we are "locked in" to limited routines. Imagine being in a dark room with no light. Then realize that we are now forced to access other senses to give us a feeling of not being lost and alone. Now the darkness is

not the concentration, but rather the feelings and the touching that will lead you into the light. And when the light appears a new feeling of relief takes hold. No longer do we think about confinement, but rather when we see the light, we realize there is more to life than concentrating on the darkness.

Please understand that the terrible virus that has us terrified will be eliminated. We will once more gather together and celebrate our survival while mourning those who did not. We will have learned that life is more than material things, or nonsensical hates. Life is precious and we have an obligation, as survivors, to show respect for the life we have been blessed with. We do that, simply, by living!



Today we held a virtual Board of Directors (BOD) meeting via Zoom, thanks to Wendy. As you can imagine, the main topic was connecting all of us to SLIC in a safe and meaningful way. We have already had two virtual services; we plan to offer at least one more on June 12. The plans for twilight services in July and August are still under discussion.

Depending on conditions that are now unknown, we will make final decisions about the High Holidays during the summer and will notify all of you then. However, our first concerns are obviously the safety, health, and welfare of all of us and we are already starting to think creatively about what virtual Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services would look like if that decision needs to be made.

For instance, Rabbi Wiener suggested a presentation of Jewish music and discussion of how and why that music fits into our services and other lewish occasions. All in all, this whole pandemic has challenged us in many ways beyond our health. "Opening up" is a tricky phrase. Does it apply to the economy only? Do we dare take chances and convene in larger groups, and when and for what reasons would we make those decisions? Will most congregants make those decisions at the same time? Obviously, not. Our individual situations inform our actions. But we, including the BOD and the professionals, all agree that our well-being is the most important consideration. Jewish War Veteran Post 619 HELPING VETERANS DESPITE SOCIAL DISTANCING

In line with social distancing and other common-sense guidelines concerning the struggle with COVID-19, the Sun Lakes Jewish War Veterans Post 619 has suspended their monthly meetings at the Sun Lakes Country Club's Mirror room until fall. Despite not being able to gather as a group to help the area's veterans, Post 619 has not been lying dormant.

Proof of this came from Joan Sisco, Founder and CEO of Veterans First Ltd. In Phoenix. Sisco, a Marine Veteran, reached out to the JWV Post with a thank you highlighting their efforts in helping local veterans:

Dear Members of Jewish War Veterans Post 619,

We are really busy packing up and delivering care boxes specific to the needs of the Veteran. Most of the Veterans we are helping are between 60 and 98...male and female. Some are not in good health; diabetes is a big issue. Most live alone with no relatives. It is sad and unacceptable that they live this way. I deliver care packages personally because I want to physically see them and have a conversation so I can assess how they are living and what they need. I recently visited 76-year-old male vet who lives in an apartment. I got there around 3:30 pm, and he said he had not eaten all day. He could not get me out of the doorway fast enough so he could eat some food. It was heartbreaking. The great thing is we are blessed to be able to find and help these Veterans so we can continue to assist them with food, hygiene and special items they need (i.e. diapers, pads, denture adhesive etc.). We pack every care package specific to their needs and what they can and like to eat. One man said he liked goulash and he got it! They are so appreciative to get these care packages. We are also assisting veterans who have been laid off due to COVID-19 with rent and utilities. We do have a few who need additional services, and I will be talking with the VA about how to accomplish this.

We appreciate so much your support in caring for our Veterans in this time of crisis. It keeps them from going out to get food and other things they need which some, after meeting them, I know cannot go out themselves. We have also been blessed with women making masks for the care packages. Please let everyone know that their donation is helping many Veterans, both male and female. We appreciate you all very much.

THOSE AMONGST US



This article by congregant Mike Milgroom was meant to appear in May's Shpiel. It highlights the life and work of the artist, Ben Shahn, who was the inspiration for the cover art that month

There have been those amongst us of whom we stand in awe: Albert Einstein, Leonardo DaVinci, Charles Darwin, Sigmund Freud, Isaac Newton, Stephen Hawking... Their brilliance has rivaled that of the stars. Their insights have come the closest to constituting "Eureka Moments" in the history of mankind.

But this article — and hopefully those to come — is not about them. Books and biographies of their lives and work are legion, and crafted by much better writers than I could ever hope to be. Rather, this article is about those others amongst us, perhaps no less brilliant, certainly not as famous, who, in a thousand different fields of endeavor, have labored to make the world we inhabit a safer, better, more understanding, more compassionate and more beautiful place. Be it through a song or a symphony that has moved us to the depth of our being, or an invention or discovery that has reshaped how we think of the order of our universe and our place within it, they have seen the beauty in a particular idea and they've followed that idea with stubborn and devoted determination till it's flowering has enriched us all.

Ben Shahn may be as unlikely a person to choose for this initial article as one could imagine. But his relevance for me will become quickly obvious. He was an artist and a social realist and his art was informed with that quality. Born in 1898 in Kaunas, Lithuania, then part of the Russian Empire, to orthodox Jewish parents, he experienced anti-Semitism early in his life. He immigrated with his mother to the United States in 1906 and settled in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn, New York. (His father had been exiled to Siberia for possible revolutionary activities in 1902 but subsequently escaped to rejoin his family.)

Shahn's path to art began in New York where he was apprenticed and trained as a lithographer. After a brief flirtation with the study of biology, he went on to study art at City College and then at the National Academy of Design. After graduating and marrying, he took the traditional "young artists' tour" to study the great European artists. But to himself, his work

during this time was uninspiring and unoriginal and he eventually gave up the pursuit of European modern art and began to search for his own voice. He turned to a more realistic style that reflected the society in which he lived.

Shahn's first major recognition came with his 23 paintings entitled "The Passion of Sacco and Vanzetti."* exhibited in 1932 and well received by the public as well as critics. The paintings were, in effect, a social statement on the politics of his time. This success gave him the confidence to pursue his own vision.


His work increasingly became rooted in social commentary. The Great Depression lay heavy upon the country and the recent migrations from Eastern Europe put pressure on the already bleak job market and threatened American workers with the possible loss of scarce jobs to newcomers. The old plagues of anti-Semitism, racism, xenophobia and nativism swung into full force. Shahn was uncomfortably familiar with repression and his work reflected this situation: many of his paintings, drawings and photographs deal with the bleakness and unfairness of the time.

Yet his work could also be compassionate and lyrical, even whimsical, with references to the Torah and other Jewish themes, as well as people, and nature. Many of his poster drawings use hand-drawn text in English and Hebrew in a style reflecting his training in graphic design.

So why did I choose Ben Shahn? What is his relevance to this issue of the Shpiel? A long time ago, when I was first introduced to his work, I became enthralled by his simple, haunting, very stylized pen-and-ink portraits of people such as Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, (the early Black Emancipation champion who himself was an escaped slave). Alongside these portraits was an illustration that struck me profoundly. It is Shahn's stunning characterization of the Holocaust. For me it is one of the most gut-wrenching representations of that black period in our history. Horror, anger, grief and sorrow are on vivid display. (cont. on pg. 9)

(cont.) I thought it appropriate, since SLJC always commemorates the occurrence of Yom HaShoah (albeit a month late) that the drawing is represented on the cover of this issue. Let me hasten to say that it is not a copy of the original Shahn drawing but, rather, my adaptation of it. (I would not presume to use his drawing for obvious copyright reasons.) I hope the essence comes through. I implore you to Google Ben Shahn and look at many examples of his work. Ben Shahn: painter, illustrator, muralist, photographer, teacher...one of those amongst us. 🏜

*Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were two Italian migrant anarchists controversially convicted of murdering a guard and a paymaster during an armed robbery in Braintree, Massachusetts in 1921. Seven years later, they were electrocuted. Both men adhered to an anarchist movement.

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
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
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DOYOU REMEMBER?
