

Planting and Harvesting

Here it is June and now the "dry heat" begins. Everything we experience until the High Holidays in September is not about the heat but about the continuity of life's journey. It seems that we count time by the holidays which include the change of

seasons. For me, it seems that the calendar flies by from one holiday to the next. Additionally, I see the plants start to bloom, the trees begin to blossom, and the earth come alive after sleeping all winter.

Our lives also concentrate on planting and harvesting. When we start out, we plant the seeds of our future by our actions and deeds. The growth that occurs is determined by the fertilizer we use and the water needed to assist in the development of that which has been planted.

lust what is the fertilizer? It consists of traditions and customs. It contains environment and habits that are learned from these exposures. As we get older, we discard some and develop others. That is part of growth. As with that which is planted, growth too accepts the environment that surrounds it, discarding some foliage and growing replacements. Life imitates nature as nature imitates human life. They are inseparable.

What is the water that sustains us? For vegetation it is rain. For us it is the water of knowledge and the benefits of exchange of ideas. It is allowing our minds to expand to absorb all that is around us, such as the plants do as they drink up the flow from springs and rivers.

Perhaps this is a circuitous way of explaining my thoughts for this time of the year – the time for relaxation – the time for slowing down – the time for planning, and the time for thoughts about our congregation.

We are a viable institution of learning and praying. We are also a collection of philanthropic and social individuals committed to the continuity of our heritage and faith. "We" happened because many dedicated people saw the need, answered the call and began a process that has changed with time. It is a living place with living emotions, living needs, living wants and desires. And we all share the pains that come with time: the loss of a loved one, the joy of celebrations. Through it all we see each other as we are, not as we think we should be.

We pitch in when needed and step back when it seems appropriate. We laugh, we cry, we interfere sometimes, we listen to things that really are insignificant. When we come together as a congregation, we understand that we are one with each other because we cannot do without each other, even those we may not be so fond of.

All of us make sacrifices in different ways. For example, when our congregation needs stability, we look for those with experience to teach us how to learn from the past to ensure the future. When our congregation has financial needs because of demographics which either take people away or find members distancing themselves because of ailments, we should be willing to come forward and help. Synagogues go through cycles as we do – we nurture (plant seeds), we feed (bring life to our experiences), we gather (harvest) our resources to give us the nourishment needed for our future.

We are planting seeds, we are watering that which we are planting, and we will harvest a crop that will be fulfilling to ourselves, to our congregation, and most of all to God.

Be safe this summer. Come back to a stronger and more secure congregation. My prayer is that the upcoming High Holidays will find us more in tune with each other so that our mission to bring a fruitful lewish experience to the Southeast Valley and beyond will find success.

Our June service, in addition to saying farewell to some, will feature our Annual Healing Service, designed to assist us in coping with ailments and helping others to come together to offer comfort with our prayers.


DEVORAH HADASSAH



FRIENDS OF ISRAEL



Israel's Population Grows to 9,500,000

Israel's population grew by 160,000 last year. 74% are Jewish, about 20% are Arab and 5% are others, including non-Arab Christians and other not designated by religion. 83% was generational growth while 17% was from immigration. 184,00 babies were born, 73% to Jewish mothers. Religiously, 45% of Jews said they were secular, while 10% said they were ultraorthodox.

Aliyah

About 25,000 people made Aliyah in 2021: 30% from Russia, 14.6% from France, 13.9% from the U.S.

and 12.4% from Ukraine. From Israel Independence Day 2021 to the same day 2022, 42,675 made Aliyah, shattering a 20-year record. Since 1948, 3,372,035 Jews have made Aliyah to Israel.

World Jewry

There are about 15.2 million Jews in the world (16.7million in 1939). 43.6% live in Israel with 8.3 million outside Israel. Approximately 6 million live in the US with the next largest country being France (446.000), then Canada and Britain. About 25.3 million worldwide would qualify for the Law of Return (at least one grandparent is Jewish or properly converted).

Again, Arnie and I want to wish you all good health and a safe summer. We look forward to seeing you again in September, as the song goes!


LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

Dear Fellow Congregant,

As you may know, Sun Lakes Congregation has not raised dues for the past five years, even though our expenses have risen drastically due to a number of issues (such as the technical support needed to tape and deliver services during COVID as well as the decline of volunteers to carry out required services necessitating paid replacements). Even with the generosity of many congregants, we find it necessary to raise dues at this time.

Our dues will go up \$25 per person, from \$175 to \$200. The budget for our new fiscal year, starting July 1st, reflects this increase and we hope you will support this change.

Please consider this letter your "invoice" and plan to send in your check in a timely manner. Enclosed in this mailing

you will also find some reminders and sign-up forms for our Break-the-Fast event and the Book of Remembrance flyer, as well as a membership form to be sure our database stays current with your address, phone number, and yahrzeit information.

Now we hope we have seen the worst of it, but some of the changes we have made will be ongoing as our membership continues to age. SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

SCOTUS NOMINATIONS

Recent hearings of the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee to evaluate nominees to the U.S. Supreme Court (SCOTUS) have been a serious disappointment to many Americans. If asked why these hearings are held, many respondents would claim that the hearings are required by the Constitution. That answer is incorrect, since the Constitution requires that presidential appointments to offices such as SCOTUS be made with the advice and consent of the Senate. Thus, hearings are not required.

In fact, from 1789 until 1916, only once was a Senate hearing held for a SCOTUS appointment. This was during the Grant administration and the investigation led to the nominee requesting that his name be withdrawn.

What happened in 1916? President Wilson nominated Louis Brandeis, a progressive attorney who had advocated for workers' rights and privacy protection. Republicans in the Senate demanded confirmation hearings, claiming that Brandeis was a socialist and a radical. Actually, he was the first lew to be nominated for elevation to the high court. It took four months (still a record) to have the vote on the confirmation,



and Brandeis was confirmed by a vote of 47 to 22. He served 23 years on the court and is considered a major influence on U.S. law.

Other Jews serving on SCOTUS include Benjamin Cardoza, Felix Frankfurter, Arthur Goldberg, Abe Fortas, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen Breyer and Elena Kagan. It must be noted that prior to the death of Justice Scalia, all nine members of the Court were either Catholic or lewish.



NEW CHAPEL ENTRY






