




Message from Our Rabbi

America

In 1945, we celebrated the final end of World War II. After much bloodshed and sacrifices, we, together with our allies, were finally victorious in a war that still reverberates to this day. The relief that followed also served a reminder that even in victory there is sadness. The needless waste of resources and humanity's disdain for the values of life's gifts caused us to pause and wonder about our purpose.

During these difficult times, we Americans came together as never before. The blood drives, the collection of fat, the rationing of things we once took for granted, the purchase of savings bonds, the entertaining of the troops, all taught us that when a nation is in need its citizens rise to the occasion. It certainly was a different time.

One thing that stood out, in my mind, was a simple song made famous during that infamous time in our history – "The House I live in." The words struck a chord in understanding of the need and affect that connection to each other offered. More than that, however, it enabled us to realize that only as one people can we ever hope to accomplish the dreams of all the generations that preceded us.

The house I live in reminded us of all we hold dear and find precious in this experiment called America. The words resonate with us because they speak to our values and ideals. The entertainers that performed and sang these lyrics of patriotism gave meaning to their significance.

The house I live in
A plot of earth, the street
The grocer and the butcher
Or the people that I meet
The children in the playground
The faces that I see
All races and religions
That's America to me

As we examine the simple words of everyday occurrences we are left to understand that America is so diverse and yet so connected. It is the diversity that was and remains the secret strength of this great nation. It is as though God gazed at this creation of young and older, white and black, Jew, Gentile, Muslim, and Hindu – on and on the differences are clear, but the bonds are unbreakable.

The place I work in
The worker by my side
The little town the city
Where my people lived and died
The howdy and the handshake
The air of feeling free
And the right to speak your mind out
That's America to me

We have just completed a most exhausting and agonizing election. Things have been said that may never be forgotten, but it is over. There will be plenty of evaluations and explanations, but it is over. What is not over is the fact that we are all Americans with the right to speak our minds. We are Americans enjoying freedoms that few in the world can truly understand.

Now is the time to join together in building an even stronger America. Two hundred forty years has taught us that only as one can we truly benefit from the many different opinions and solutions. Only as one can we overcome the vitriol that seems to have settled in our hearts and minds. Together, we succeed, separate, we fail. It really is that simple.

The lyrics end with a startling reminder – “Especially the people, that’s America to me.” Stand next to a friend or relative and look at your reflection in the mirror. The only resemblance is that each has a nose and two eyes, two ears, a mouth. This is where the similarities end because if we look closer we see two different people. This is the strength of America – similar, but different.

Now is the time to join with one another and know that through the tears, and the dreams, and the growing, we have developed a country that has never been duplicated, nor will it ever be.

1945 may have been a different time, but the messages of those offerings are no different today. As we journey into a new chapter in our history perhaps it is appropriate to also remember that by the Grace of God do we flourish.

At this time we will also pay tribute to the men and women who serve our country as we remember the fallen commemorated by Memorial Day.

Yes, it is a busy month, but together we will celebrate, commemorate and rejoice in the milestones we have reached. This past month has been somewhat taxing as we have lost long time members and friends. Perhaps, together, we will learn to accept and be grateful for all the blessings we receive from a caring and loving God.

May the holiday of Shavuot remind us of our good fortune as we continue our journey with each other in search of a meaningful life.

Cantorial Notes - Lu Y'hi-May It Be

In honor of Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israel's Independence Day) the choir and I will be singing a Naomi Shemer song called "Lu Y'hi." When the Yom Kippur War broke out in 1973, it was this song that best expressed the feelings of both the front lines and the homeland. The words were written at the request of the singer Hava Alberstein to the melody of the Beatles' song "Let It Be." However, the Hebrew version is not a direct translation of the Beatles' version. Lu Y'hi was inspired by "Let it be" but the words reflect the feelings of the Israeli people at the time.

Shemer's second husband, Mordechai Horowitz, felt that words of such high quality deserved their own melody. At the very same time, Israel Television asked Shemer to take part in a program called "Meeting with Artists," which was televised live every evening. Shemer wrote the new melody on her way to Herzliya Studios. That same evening, she performed "Lu Y'hi" for the first time, accompanying herself on the piano. Hava Alberstein eventually recorded the song, as did the Ha-Gashash ha-Hiver trio.

The second half of the lyrics are:

Chorus: May it be, may it be, please-may it be, all that we seek, may it be.

Within a small, shaded neighborhood

Is a small house with a red roof

All that we ask for, may it be

This is the end of summer, the end of the path

Allow them to return safely here

All that we seek, may it be

And if suddenly, rising from the darkness

Over our heads, the light of a star shines

All that we ask for, may it be

Then grant tranquility and also grant strength

To all those we love

All that we seek, may it be

As Yom Ha'atmaut approaches, let us all pray for peace in Israel and around the world.

April Board Decisions

1. Next Board meeting will be held on May 4th.
2. Final vote on budget for September 1, 2017 through August 31, 2018 by the board will occur at the May board meeting.

**Summary of Changes to SLJC Bylaws
Version 2.5**

ARTICLE III

Section 1:

- Such other officers and assistant officers and agents as may be deemed necessary shall be appointed at the discretion of the President **for a term to be determined by the President** (added text in red).

Section 6:

- **Remove timeline of two weeks for distribution of minutes by Recording Secretary and eliminated submission of summary of Board minutes for publication in the Shpiel.**

ARTICLE IV

Section 2:

- **Increased number of Board of Directors to eleven.**
- **Term limits expanded to three two year terms**
- **During a fiscal year**, by a 2/3 vote, the Board of Directors shall have the power to **temporarily** increase or decrease the number of Directors on the Board **for that fiscal year**.

ARTICLE V Section 1:

- **The timing of the meeting was changed from October to the first quarter of the year (September to November).**

Article VI Section 1:

- **Removed the word standing and removed the list of committees**
- **Text now reads: The President shall form appropriate committees each year and shall assign chairpersons and/or liaisons to the board from those committees. The president shall also assign various liaisons to the Board for any outside committee in which the Congregation participates.**

Article VI Section 2:

- **Will be removed as it is already addressed in the previous section.**

Article XI Amendments

- **Removed the word written from second paragraph in two places. Now states Notice must be given to the members...**

Article XII Dues

- **Dues notices will be published in The Shpiel prior to the beginning of the fiscal year at which time the dues shall be payable (upon receipt).**

Op. Ed.: The Israeli Economy's Got Intel Inside

Intel Corp.'s investments in Israel were already shaping the country's growth statistics, even before its record acquisition last week.

The world's largest chipmaker agreed to pay \$15 billion for Jerusalem-based Mobileye NV, a maker of semiconductors and software for driverless cars – the most ever paid for an Israeli tech firm.

The deal comes after economists including Modi Shafir at Mizrahi Tefahot Bank said Israel's unexpected 6.5 percent fourth quarter expansion – the fastest pace in at least ten years – was in part driven by Intel's \$6 billion renovation of its plant at Kiryat Gat in southern Israel.

Intel, based in Santa Clara, California, employs 10,000 people in Israel – the most among the country's largest exporters. Next-ranked Teva Pharmaceuticals Industries Ltd., the world's largest maker of generic drugs, has close to 7,000 staff in the country.

While other global tech giants including Alphabet Inc., Apple Inc. and Facebook Inc. have research and development centers in Israel, their investments pale in comparison to Intel's. The company exported products worth \$3.35 billion from Israel last year, or nearly a tenth of the high-tech sector's overseas sales.

Although it's difficult to quantify, Intel's influence goes beyond exports and direct employment, according to Rafael Gozlan, chief economist at Israel Brokerage & Investments Ltd. in Tel Aviv. Former Intel workers are also using their experience to start their own tech businesses, he said, and the Mobileye deal could give the finance ministry extra room to cut taxes.

Israel Appoints Its First Female Muslim Diplomat

The Foreign Ministry on Wednesday appointed Rasha Atamny, 31, to represent the Jewish state in Ankara, Turkey, making her Israel's first female Muslim diplomat.

Atamny, who is completing the final months of the ministry's cadet course, will serve as the embassy's first secretary in the influential Muslim nation.

Turkey is an important regional ally for Israel, with strong economic ties. The two countries signed a reconciliation agreement in June, 2016, ending a six-year rift.

Atamny hails from the Arab town of Baqa al-Gharbiya in central Israel, located just inside the pre-1967 Green Line between Israel and the West Bank.

She is not Israel's first female Arab diplomat. Christian-Arab Rania Jubran, the daughter of Supreme Court Justice Salim Jubran, worked for the ministry from 2006 to 2009, but left shortly before she was due to be sent to Cairo.

Israel also has several male Muslim and Christian diplomats.
