Messages from our Clergy



It is hard to imagine, but it is October. Unfortunately we live in an area that does not offer the changing of colors – the leaves are green all year. If you like to see nature in its glory, perhaps a drive north to Flagstaff or surrounding areas will give you the opportunity to remember what seasons are all about.

It is just as hard to imagine that the High Holidays are still with us. There was a time when the beginning of October meant the World Series. And, if you can remember, the World Series of Baseball always fell on Yom Kippur. Perhaps you will also remember the rabbi occasionally interrupting the service to announce the score. In those days it was the Yankees vs. the Dodgers. It seemed that they were the only two teams in the leagues.

Well, this year, we do not have the World Series yet, but we will gather for Yom Kippur, October 8 – 9. Yom Kippur represents the culmination of "Asereh Y'may Teshuvah," the ten days of Repentance (from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur). Our tradition teaches that starting with the Hebrew month of Elul until the first of day of the Hebrew month of Tishrei (30 days) we prepare for the Days of Awe with S'lichot prayers. It is sort of a dress rehearsal for the final day of Repentance, Yom Kippur.

There are so many memories of that period. The one that stands out is the midnight service. The time was chosen, as a reminder that time was not the criteria in beseeching God. There was no time of day or night that was an inconvenience in seeking forgiveness from God. At the altar were the cantor, rabbi, choir, and temple dignitaries, all assembled to remind us of the solemnity of the season. The haunting music resonated throughout the temple and we felt a sense of connection.

There are other traditions that remind us of our heritage and obligations to each other, our past, and to God. One that we practice as a congregation is KEVER AVOT –visiting the graves of our ancestors. There is a service at the cemetery and then individual visits to gravesites where special prayers are recited.

This year, as in the past, we will hold this service at the Valley of the Sun Cemetery, Chandler Heights Boulevard, Sunday, October 6 - 10:30 am. We will gather in the Chapel at the cemetery and then, following the service, the cantor and I will be available to visit individual graves for the special prayers that are recited. I encourage everyone to participate in this meaningful experience.

Most of us have relatives and friends resting in distant locations. This is an opportunity to visit all of them through this service. It is also an opportunity to show support and offer comfort to each other as we remember everyone who meant so much to us.

Presídent's Message

Last month I wrote about the synagogue as a three-pillared organization: spirituality, community, and fiscal stability. Thinking about all of these, I believe SLJC needs to do better in the area of community.

I was dismayed at the last Board of Directors meeting to hear the stories from at least two current BOD members. As they recounted their first experiences with SLJC, both said that nobody went out of their way to welcome them in any way. For one, who was brand new to the local area, the word she used about us was cold. The other member repeated the memory of not having anyone approach them or do anything to make them feel comfortable as a newcomer. Fortunately for us, both eventually found their way back to SLJC.

But at the BOD meeting, we had a lively discussion about ways that we could and should be more welcoming. Showing a laissez-faire attitude actually hurts us in terms of sustaining membership and attracting newcomers to join SLJC. Things as simple as inviting newcomers to sit with you at the Oneg Shabbat make a huge difference. If they have someone to talk to, who takes an interest in them, it makes a huge difference in how they feel about us. Too often when new people walk across the street alone and enter the Navajo Room, they are told that there is no room at a table because we're sitting with or saving seats for friends. It's no wonder they never come back! The simple act of moving another chair or two to your table and squeezing together makes them feel wanted and comfortable.

Another welcoming gesture is to get the contact info of newcomers and call them, perhaps even inviting them to join you for dinner at your home or at a restaurant. Getting to know one another helps them to feel connected, and connections create community. By taking an interest in them, we may all benefit. We have the possibility of making new friends, or at the very least, of directing them to SLJC activities and other people with whom they may have things in common.

Next month at services, when newcomers introduce themselves (no matter if they're permanent Arizonans, snowbirds, or visitors), think about approaching them after services to let them know we're happy they're among us. Remember, it's daunting to walk into a new situation. The last thing we want or need is to lose current or future members because they think we don't want them.

Kever Avot

Our annual Kever Avot service to be held at the valley of the Sun Cemetery, October 6th at 10:30, is a tradition that dates to the early history of our people. During the Talmudic period people were known to visit the graves of their rabbis to ask them to intercede on their behalf before God. This was done prior tom Yom Kippur.

However, the actual tradition of visiting the graves of our ancestors began in the 14th centuryand was a strong commitment in Sephardic communities. These visits also included requests for interceding.

Tashlich



If you have an opportunity to visit a pond or any body of water, perhaps symbolically throuwing away the past will enhance your ability to feel the majestic magic of the holiday.

I think of no better way to begin a new that with those we cherish and with whom we share a common bond of commitment to our faith.

Richard Agins

Richard Agins began his career in 1970 as the controller of a large New York construction company. During his time with that company he earned his Master of Business Administration degree in accounting and finance. He left the company in 1975 to join a public accounting firm and fulfill the requirements to become a CPA. He earned his certification in 1976. After leaving the practice of public accounting in 1977, Richard worked as Chief Financial Officer and Vice-President for a major New York City construction contractor, where he oversaw cost– and financial accounting, negotiated major material purchase contracts and contract change orders, and managed the company's quarterly and annual reporting for inclusion in the Forms 10-Q and 10-K filings of its parent company with the Securities and Exchange Commission.

In 1984 Richard founded a management consulting firm with clients in the construction, manufacturing, wholesale distribution and food production industries, in which he implemented efficiency and cost-saving measures that increased his clients' productivity and profitability.

Richard became CEO of a fashion accessories design and manufacturing company in 1988, where he took charge of operations, finance, sales and production until 2003, when he graduated from Pace University School of Law with his *Juris Doctor, cum laude*.

From 2003 until 2009, Richard was an attorney with Bingham McCutchen, LLP, where he worked on major corporate restructurings, M&A transactions and corporate finance engagements for major insurance companies and distressed investor/hedge fund clients. In mid-2009, Richard became a partner in a start-up law firm with offices in Connecticut, New York and Pennsylvania. His book of business included corporate and limited liability company formation, bankruptcy, employment law, commercial real estate transactions, construction-related litigation, estate planning (Wills and Trusts), and immigration law.

In 2013 Richard moved to Arizona. He first joined a small law firm handling all of its bankruptcy, personal injury and corporate work. When that firm closed its doors late in 2014, Richard launched Agins Law Firm, PLC, which focused its practice on estate planning, business transactional matters, bankruptcy and elder law. Richard also served as in-house counsel for a CPA firm for two years during that time, handling all of its legal transactional and litigation matters.

In 2019, Richard joined the LegalShield division of Davis Miles McGuire Garner, where he handles business law, estate planning, probate, bankruptcy, construction, consumer finance, and landlord/tenant matters.

Michael Abrams and his wife, Helen Bernstein-Abrams, have lived in Sun Lakes since 2014. Prior to that, they lived in the Chicago area, where they both were born. Michael is a retired CPA. 
