



RABBI IRWIN WIENER

Sitting at the Computer and Wondering



There are so many times I sit at the computer and wonder about things such as the gloom and doom that seems to surround us. I read, listen, and watch the so-called experts ramble on about everything, determining nothing. These same people will twist words to fit their agenda. It seems that honesty is a nasty

word signifying nothing.

So, here I sit at the computer, imagining a world filled with wishes and desires that will bring comfort and happiness. Perhaps some are thinking of a world where the streets are safe. Maybe some will dream of contentment, knowing that each day brings beauty and enrichment. There are those who see a planet not self-destructing, or people talking to one another without shouting or recriminations.

Before long I realize that some of what I envision is fantasy, not reality. However, I also believe that hope is necessary for sanity if nothing else. It certainly is good to imagine, but life, while it may contain the aspirations of humanities desires for completion, contains hurt and destruction.

Then doubts set in. Faith seems to be remote, prayer a waste of time. Life seems to be so insignificant with decency and family values ridiculed. Despair sets in and all looks hopeless. Some of us spend a lifetime trying to encourage and fortify, but doubts seem to creep through, and we wonder, "to what purpose." So, if people of faith lose hope, what happens to the rest?

There are disappointments and frustrations, but if we attempt to make things right, then that is all we should be satisfied with. I have mentioned numerous times God does not require us to complete the work, but at the same

time, we are not free from trying. It is in the trying that we gain the confidence. It is in the trying that we enhance our faith. It is in the trying that we can realize the necessity to join for survival. The frustration comes from feeling that we failed because our expectations are unrealistic.

All the philosophers in the world, both past and present, have concluded (most prominent of which was Spinoza) that there are people enslaved by fortune. They seem forced to trail in the wake of the worst, even though they can see what is better.

Time and again we listen and read about events over which we have no control. Time and again we observe arrogance of such proportions that it, too, becomes reality. The hypocrisy and deceit seem to be normal, honesty and decency the abnormal. Truth is no longer the hallmark of civilized encounters. We now live in a world dominated by "Me," not "We."

What we are witnessing today are the difficulties we are experiencing daily and which are in control of our destiny. The wishes of yesterday are no longer the desires of today. The condition we find ourselves in today was certainly created by us, and if that is so, then we have the power and the ability and the will to change what is into what should be.

Perhaps we should try to attempt to turn this hatred and accusatory rhetoric so that it will match what was written by a young girl, Anne Frank, who was taken from us in the prime of her life: "Think of all the beauty left around you and be happy."

This is what I would love to see as I sit at my computer. Wouldn't you? Perhaps the New Year just ushered in will be the beginning of these wishes coming true. 🕯️



CO-PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Well, our new year has begun and we are continuing to make adjustments due to COVID as we go. We were really hoping this would be a non-issue by now, but here we still are. To accommodate, the BOD has made the following decisions (which we will revisit as conditions hopefully change for the better):

At least through December, we will provide live streaming of our services.

All monthly services will still be offered at the Chapel in person on the second Friday night of the month, as usual. Masking will be required.

- Instead of holding our usual Oneg Shabbats, those who attend services will receive a “grab-and-go” treat as you leave the Chapel. This is our new version, delightfully termed “Go-neg.”
- We will still be seeking volunteers (perhaps those of you celebrating birthdays or anniversaries) to accept aliyot, ark openings, or readings.

Furthermore, the BOD has discussed some important policies regarding the Marty Silverman Memorial Campaign. As you know, this fund was started to perpetuate the Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation and ensure that a rich Jewish life congregational life would continue to thrive in the Southeast Valley. One of the ways we have been perpetuating our Yiddishkeit is by reaching out to you all through technology (i.e. Zoom adult education programs, Zoom onegs, services on YouTube, wi-fi connections in the Chapel, and technicians to support these offerings).

As you can imagine, technology is expensive and has caused us to budget and spend more than we had planned because of the length of the COVID surge. Therefore, we have asked the Finance Committee to make recommendations about using some of the money in the Silverman Fund to defray these expenses. The BOD will deliberate and vote on these recommendations at the October meeting, and we will report to you any decisions made. With your help, we hope to continue to grow this fund, now at more than \$11,000. New and renewed contributions are encouraged and very much appreciated.

We are delighted to report that we have 17 new members this year. As the year goes on, we hope they will be welcomed into our congregational life and activities:

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

MARTY GLICKMAN

Marty Glickman was a world class sprinter while attending James Madison H.S. in Brooklyn, and as an adult, was a renowned sportscaster. His descriptive narrative allowed radio listeners to “see” the game. Following the recent Tokyo Olympics, a story about Marty that involves sports, politics and racism was remembered.

Marty was born to two Jewish parents who had immigrated separately from Romania, met in New York, married, and settled in Brooklyn after Marty was born in 1917. In 1936, Marty was on the American Olympic track team, one of four sprinters running the 4X100 meter relay who were expected to capture the gold medal. The early days of the track competition were dominated by Jesse Owens, who collected three golds. Adolph Hitler, who attended the track events, refused to shake hands with Owens who was an African-American.

As much as the Nazis derided Blacks, they hated Jews even more. Two of the American 4x100 team were Jewish: Glickman and Sam Stoller. A Nazi official approached Avery Brundage, the leader of the U.S. Olympians, to ask that the Jewish runners be removed, so that Germans would not lose to Jews on the world



stage. Stoller and Glickman were replaced by Owens and Ralph Metcalfe, without explanation. They were the only American Olympians who were fit to compete who did NOT participate.

Marty Glickman went on to star in track and football at Syracuse University and served as Marine officer in World War II. In 1998, the U.S. Olympic Committee honored Glickman and Stoller (who was deceased) with a plaque "in lieu of the gold medals they didn't win" in Berlin. Marty retired from broadcasting in 1992 and died following open-heart surgery in 2001. 🕯️





