A New Year

Time seems to have a way of escaping us no matter how we try to hold on to it. It also seems that we close our eyes for a moment and when we open them, we feel as though we have traveled to another time, another place. What happened

to yesterday? Was it just a moment ago when we felt the flow of energy that gave us the impetus for life's journey? It really doesn't matter because here and now we are getting ready to celebrate a New Year.

A New Year gives us many opportunities to not only cast off the past but look forward to the future as well. This year, however, we will commemorate another year together a little differently. The COVID-19 virus has caused us to reorganize our celebration while isolated from each other. But, please remember that we are not isolated from God. In fact, perhaps we can get even closer knowing that God is isolated as well from the encounters of collective prayers.

The doors of our synagogue are closed, but the essence of its enduring character is open to us if we take the time to understand its importance in our lives. Some will say that the synagogue is really not that important and is not the panacea for the continuation of Jewish survival, but rather adherence to traditions and laws and customs. To me the synagogue represents all these things and more.

The synagogue was designed to bring together all forms of religious observance. It was created to deliver a place and time for study and worship that otherwise would not be part of our daily expressions. How many set aside time for prayer or allocate time for study? We are busy with all sorts of issues that require time and money for everyday living. Perhaps there are occasions that draw our attention heavenward, but they are nowhere near the time needed for gratitude and sorrow.

Judaism without the centrality of the synagogue will not survive. Say what you will about organized religion; its purpose is undeniable: To maintain that tie that will ensure religious survival. *I declare, here and now, that supporting the synagogue is tantamount to observing all the laws because it leads us to them.* The Temple in Jerusalem was ordained because it was the focal point of all things holy and all things necessary for life. To hold the value of our synagogue in any less stature is to demean the essence of our heritage.

So here we are — a New Year, not only representing the march of time but also marking the belief in creation through the care and concern of nature. And, here we are welcoming and encouraging involvement in our religious life here in Sun Lakes (and beyond) so that this generation, and the ones that follow will point with pride as they proclaim, "This was done for me."

While we continue to encounter the difficulties of this dreaded disease, let us remember that when a new day dawns it will contain the wishes and aspirations of all who lived through these trying times. Our gratitude will be directed to a God who gave us the ability to survive which will allow us to express this thankfulness in the one place we can all come together — the synagogue!

I pray that each of us will witness a New Year filled with dreams and connections and celebrations. Then with one voice, in joyful chorus, we will pronounce the *Shehechyanu* prayer and truly understand it. 🕯️



HIGH HOLIDAY PROTOCOLS

This has been a challenging year so far, and it continues to be. While we all wish we could experience our services together, the Board of Directors, Rabbi Wiener, Cantor Ronda Polesky, and members of the Ritual Committee have joined Wendy and me in developing our plans for the High Holidays. We have taken into account the importance of maintaining good health and safety, and we have learned from medical experts and leaders of other temples (and many churches) that returning for live services right now is just not a good idea. Below is the protocol we will follow:

- We will present High Holiday services through our link on YouTube. You will be sent this link again.

- Rabbi Wiener will be answering any discussion questions you may have via YouTube on Monday, September 28, from 2:30 to 3:30 pm. You are invited to submit any questions to him via email (ravyitz@cox.net) in advance of Yom Kippur. The Rabbi will also have discussion topics as well.

- We will not have a Torah procession, but all the relevant Torah portions will be read.

- We expect all the services (listed above) to take about 90 minutes each, give or take.

- Instead of our customary congregational Break-the-Fast, we are offering prepared “box suppers” (consisting of all the items that would have been on the buffet table — bagels, nova lox, cream cheese,



- Services will be available at their regular times – 7 pm on Erev Rosh Hashanah (Friday, September 18) and Kol Nidrei (Sunday, September 27).

- Daytime services for Rosh Hashanah will be available from 10 am on Saturday, September 19.

- Yom Kippur morning services will be available from 10 am on Monday, September 28.

- Afternoon services for Yom Kippur, including Yizkor, will be available from 4 pm on Monday, September 28.

creamed herring, tuna salad, egg salad, vegetables, and dessert) at the same price listed in previous flyers—\$15 and no cost for children under age 3. These box suppers must be ordered before Wednesday, September 16 and will be available for pick up at Cottonwood Ballroom from 5:30 to 6:30 pm on Monday, September 28. We’re hoping to have a drive-up delivery service. (See page 6 for the order form.)

- We will be distributing High Holiday prayer books for you to borrow so you can participate in the

service at home. Distribution dates are Thursday, September 17 between 4 and 6 pm and Friday, September 18 between 9 and 11 am in front of the Chapel. Your books will be handed to you by a volunteer wearing a mask and gloves, and we would appreciate your wearing a mask as well.

- The return date for the books will be Tuesday, September 29 from 9 to 11 am and from 4 to 6 pm on the same day.

- The Book of Remembrance and Jewish calendars will be distributed on Thursday, September and Friday, September 18 with High Holiday prayer books. If you still want your loved ones to be remembered in this book, you must have your form (see page 7 for the form) and check filled out and returned to Susan and Michael Cohen by Wednesday, September 2.

- Services will be different, but we expect that they will still be beautiful and meaningful. Although we will not be together or able to enjoy our wonderful choir, we will still enjoy our fabulous cellist on Yom Kippur and will hear the Shofar at the end of Yom Kippur services on Monday afternoon as well as lovely music from Ronda and Shea.

- If you would like to have an aliyah, open/close the ark, or be involved in any way during the service,

please contact Shelly Henden. You would come to the Chapel during taping of that particular service and be called for your honor with nobody in the pews and no choir. Usually the only people involved in the taping are Rabbi Wiener, Cantor Ronda, Shea Marshall, our audio technician, and the co-presidents. We all try to maintain social distancing.

- Because of the dates of the High Holidays, we will not hold regular Shabbat services in September. We will inform you about the plans for October and ensuing months as soon as we can.

This year has certainly brought us the unexpected, but we're trying very hard to make lemonade out of lemons. We hope you will continue to support Sun Lakes Jewish Congregation with your annual membership so that when we "open up" again, we will all be together as a strong Jewish community. Everyone on the Board of Directors joins our professionals in wishing you a safe, healthy, and happy New Year.

DISCUSSION & BOOK REVIEW

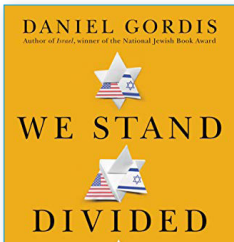


**Sunday, October 25

Book Review

We Stand Divided is by Daniel Gordis, a professor, historian and author of several award-winning books on Jewish thoughts and political currents in Israel.

Multiple surveys over the last year indicate that a strong majority of American Jews support Israel. This support has become more qualified over time, with

many American Jews pointing to the lack of religious pluralism, dislike for Netanyahu, and the treatment of Palestinians as the reason. Gordis believes that this evolving divide actually began during the evolution of Zionism in the late 1800s.

The difference in perspective also relates to the different desires of Jews who emigrated to the U.S. compared to those settling in Israel during the great periods of Jewish relocation. Different views of democracy, Judaism as a nation state vs. a religion, the unequal engagement with Jewish history, and other reasons are explored. Gordis concludes with the impact of these attitudinal differences and some potential alternatives to the evolving trends.

This book is a major contribution to the understanding of the dynamics between American Jews and Israel, is very readable and cites many historical milestones for any desired further reading. I recommend the book as being a unique contribution to a very relevant topic to the future of global Judaism.

An Ecumenical program honoring Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Hanukkah. Through this collective celebration, we will better understand the meaning of salvation and redemption.

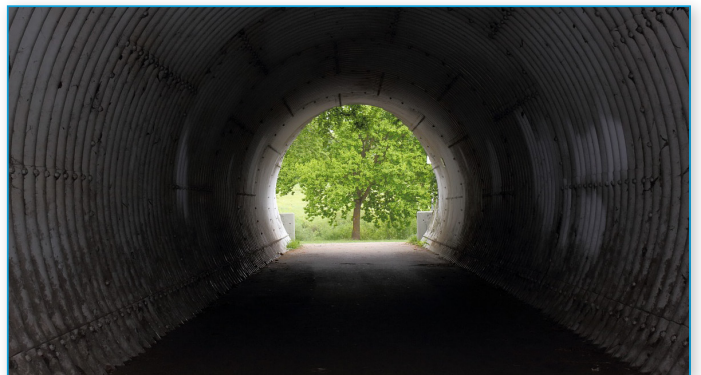
Shalom Hadassah
