# Shanah Tovah

It was approximately 2,500 years ago that a prophet of Israel roamed the countryside preaching about the goodness of humanity and how it could be found in each of us. In fact, he emphasized that the most enduring force known to man was the power of our ability to conquer the wrongdoing we witness every day.

There are many ways we can accomplish what was suggested so long ago. For example, we can support institutions that give others the ability to survive and even carry themselves with dignity. Every day we witness the poverty and misery of those less fortunate. And there are those among us who were more independent but somehow woke one day to the progress of time.

It is not enough to acknowledge the problems. We are obligated, as partners with God, to ensure that the tear in our society is repaired to the best of our ability. Each tear in the fabric of our existence should bring us closer to understanding our place in the journey we are embarked upon. Age should not be a deterrent to reaching out to lend a helping hand. Rather it should encourage us to do more because we have been there and have seen the results of indifference. 

# SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

SOME FIRST CENTURY ROMANS By Murray Siegel

Tiberius Julius Alexander, Julia Berenice, and Marcus Julius Agrippa were all wealthy citizens of the Roman empire during the latter part of the first century. Is there something about these three people that you might not know? Actually, there are two unusual facts about Julius, Julia and Marcus that you might not expect. All three of these Roman citizens were Jewish and all were friends and admirers of Vespasian, the Roman emperor at the end of the first century.

Why was it unusual for Jews to be friends with Vespasian? Prior to being emperor, he was the army general responsible for quelling the Jewish rebellion in Judea. His troops sacked the Holy Temple and he was responsible for enslaving thousands of Jews. Many of the affluent Jews did not favor the rebels, knowing that the Roman army was strong enough to win the war. They were concerned about how the rebellion would affect Jews throughout the empire.

It should be noted that in the first and second centuries, most Romans had respect for the Jewish faith, but they



considered Jews as atheists since they did not believe in the "true" gods (such as Jupiter and Venus). That changed early in the fourth century when Emperor Constantine converted to Christianity, made Rome a Christian empire, and elevated that religion at the expense of all others, including Judaism.

### JEWISH WAR VETERANS COPPER STATE POST 619 RANCHO MILAGRO FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR VANESSA KOHNEN WILL SPEAK ABOUT EQUINE THERAPY

Rancho Milagro Founder and Executive Director Vanessa Kohnen will speak about equine therapy at the Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 breakfast, Sunday, September 10. The meeting takes place in the Poolside building at Oakwood Country Club, 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd., in Sun Lakes. A "Meet & Greet," with FREE lox and bagels, coffee and doughnuts starts at 9:30 am, followed by the speaker at 10 am. All are welcome.

Rancho Milagro, a non-profit organization, was founded by Vanessa and her husband, Robert, in 2014, for people who have experienced trauma. Equine therapy is used to help treat people in need, including veterans with PTSD, anxiety, and depression.

"Rancho Milagro started from my own personal childhood trauma," confessed Vanessa. "As a child of abuse, I found my only refuge was with my animals. By giving me a purpose, horses saved my life, for which I am thankful and am now ready to help others start a journey to their own personal recovery," she concluded.

The animals at Rancho Milagro can understand and relay the emotions for individual patients. "Can you imagine a 1,000-pound animal mimicking what you're experiencing?" asks Kohnen. "We always say we want somebody else to understand what we're going through. Well, guess what: the horses do, and we are able to watch these beautiful animals mirror the same emotions," Kohnen said, adding "This is why equine therapy works so well."

Research shows that equine-assisted therapy is effective for treating survivors experiencing depression, anxiety, and/or trauma-related symptoms, as well as ADHD, autism, dissociative disorders, and other mental health diagnoses. In one representative study, survivors showed increased confidence, self-esteem, assertiveness, emotional regulation, and resourcefulness because of this form of therapy. In some cases, just a few sessions of equine therapy can produce improvement.



# **Memorial Prayers**

There are times established for us to remember loved ones. They are times to remind ourselves of the sumtotal of their journey with us. Our remembrances will also ensure immortality for all whom we love and miss. The time I refer to is designated as *yahrzeits*.

We light a candle, think about what was, and hope that the flame that burns will remain with us for all time, even as it eventually extinguishes itself until we light it again. However, the flame of their existence will burn within us forever.

We light candles as well during the four times we recite the ancient Memorial Prayers – the *yizkor*. We join in expressing our feelings and the tender moments shared.

Each person remembered came to us through the generosity of a loving God. All our memories contain the legacies we inherited. Each life was precious, filled with dreams and frustrations, hopes and despair.

Death helps us understand creation. We are born, we live, we learn, we endure, and then we are no more. But we are reborn again in a thought, a happening, and for sure, in the reward waiting for all of us — the gift from God — life everlasting.

We have the capacity to rekindle the flame of pleasant remembrances, of laughter and joyous occasions so that the memories of our loved ones will remain a blessing.
