As Time Goes By

Thankfully, we are once again gathering to celebrate and commemorate milestones in our lives. So many things happened to us during the last two years. There certainly was sadness but there was also gladness. However, we

seem to dwell on the misery and misfortune that occurs and forget too often the beautiful happenings that make us appreciate life.

Some of us concentrate on our ailments and forget how glorious the next day can be, requiring us to have a combination of faith and determination. It is easy to become disillusioned and feel as though the world is crashing down on us. And, at times, it probably is. But those moments soon disappear, and we find that a new day dawns and we are-able-to move on to the next moment in our lives.

As time goes by, we tend to focus on the past because we, somehow cannot envision a future. Day after day the same routine and day after day we see our circle of friends vanish. It is more difficult, at this stage in our lives, to make new friends.

It reminded me of us! There are some in our community who want desperately to hold onto the traditions of the past and still breathe the air of modernity. There are those who want only to journey into the realm of that which is proven. And there are those who want to abandon belief and substitute it with a faithless morality.

The question you may ask is what are we celebrating and what are we commemorating? Because we are so fond of labels, we call them traditions. Broken down they are the sum-total of what we have learned, and what we accept or reject. However, I would suggest that we grow by experimenting and we hold onto the past through the recitation of prayers and rituals that remind us who we are.

On the one hand there are those who believe in strict adherence, derived from that which is written together with how it is interpreted. Finally, there are those who believe that customs and traditions that are thrown into the mix convince us of the rightness of what is believed. However, when we stir the pot out comes a mix of many faiths and beliefs.

On the other hand, I find that the primary issue is comfortability. If we are not satisfied with our observance, to whatever extent, then it stands to reason that we will not follow through with understanding what we do or do not do to reach spiritual fulfillment. This requires experimentation. To experiment, however, requires a commitment to spiritual growth.

To me the essence of what religious observance signifies is defined by our actions. Words alone do not make us pious or worthy of divine consideration. Deeds that accompany the words are the necessary ingredients for a successful, fruitful life. When we do for others, we in turn do for ourselves. This is the cycle of connection and love that makes us acceptable in the eyes of God.

May we all be blessed with the beauty of life filled with satisfaction and contentment. May God continue to grant us good health and long life, but most of all, quality of life so that all that was created will bring us joy and happiness with all our memories of the past, but with an eye to our future.

Maybe then we will find fulfillment in Easter and Passover. 24



FRIENDS OF ISRAEL

HUNDREDS OF UKRAINIAN REFUGEES HAVE LANDED IN ISRAEL. THOUSANDS MORE COULD FOLLOW.

300 Ukrainian Jews arrived in Israel as of March 6, 2022, with Russia invading the Ukraine to impose its will on this free and democratic state.

For those among us who are critical of Israel for whatever reason, this headline speaks volumes. Over the centuries, the Jewish peoples have been displaced from generation to generation, moving and moving over and over again just to survive and sustain our true identity. And now, since 1948, finally a safe haven, Israel, welcomes all Jews from any place in the world to live safely in the only democracy in the Middle East. This land is where Jews have lived continuously for centuries, sometimes in splendor and other times under difficult circumstances. But now the splendor has been again realized in the one place on earth that Jews can be guaranteed a safe haven.

Natan Sharansky, Soviet dissident and retired head of the Jewish Agency, recently said, "This week, I was reminded of those days when I saw thousands of people standing at the borders of Ukraine trying to escape. The world has changed. When I was a child, 'lew' was an unfortunate designation. No one envied us. But today on the Ukrainian border, identifying as a lew is a most fortunate circumstance. It describes those who have a place to go, where their family, an entire nation, is waiting for them on the other side."

Is Israel, like any other democracy, perfect? Maybe not. Critics, remember Israel is the only site on earth that Jews can rapidly, safely and freely flee when oppressed to the point that celebrating and living their Judaism is at risk.



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
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Passover: A Message of Renewal



We are entering a period that illustrates renewal clearly and distinctly: Passover.

It is an event in history that gives us the ultimate expression of how steadfastness and faith can lead to redemption. However, it also teaches us that liberation can only be achieved when we are willing to take that first leap of faith through our own ability to collaborate with G-d in restoring our dignity.

This requires faith in ourselves. It is a primary ingredient in fulfilling the mission of independence and release. It is not enough to sit back and expect G-d to be the messenger and doer in our final renewal, but rather the combination of the two completes the process.

The Exodus reaches a thunderous climax at Mt. Sinai, and it is there that we begin to understand the partnership. Moses makes one request of G-d. Through all that has been accomplished and yet to be realized, Moses wants to be able to see the G-d that brought about these wonders, from deliverance to revelation. Moses, above all, has had the most intimate relationship with G-d that any human has experienced; still, to him, it was not enough. Moses wants more — to see, to touch, to feel.



Perhaps this Passover (in particular) we should realize that what we have experienced in attempting to maintain some semblance of relevance in a darkened world will give us the strength to live life to the fullest. I can think of no better way to commemorate a holiday that gave us life as a people.
