

The Generations That Follow

If there is anything sure in this life, it is the continuation of the generations. The journey of life contains so many experiences, but the glue that gives life meaning is the knowledge that when we are gone, there will be

another to take our place. That has been and continues to be the design of creation.

There are many ways to guarantee the future. There is love, which includes embracing everyone regardless of who and where they came from. There is support for those things we hold dear so that those who follow will inherit traditions and understandings from which to continue to build a future. There is service to one's ideals, which we hope will encourage those who continue to realize the values we hold dear.

All of these things come to mind when I think about the season just around the corner. The essence of Hanukkah is the understanding that love conquers all: the love of God. There can be no brighter light emanating from the menorah than the light of understanding and faithfulness.

Hanukkah helps us understand the true meaning of compassion and strength. Light not only represents awareness but it also enables us to find our way in the darkness that surrounds us. It doesn't only matter that there was enough oil for one day or that it lasted for eight. It doesn't only matter that a band of zealots overcame unimaginable odds to secure religious freedom for all. What does matter is that we remember and we tell the story, in whatever form, however we embellish it. What does really matter is that we are here to do just that and every faith on the face of the earth owes its existence to this seemingly insignificant feat that took place 2200 years ago.


That is continuity in its highest form, and it is how love and devotion to faith will guarantee that the generations will follow. It is service to community and to synagogue that also makes Hanukkah so special.

Our commitment to lewish survival enabled us to reach out to others in various communities. We are part of a greater lewish presence in this valley. And all this was made possible because of vision and sacrifice.

The Mishnah teaches that in the beginning God created only one person to teach us the lesson that if you destroy a single person, it is as if you have destroyed the whole world. And if you save the life of a single person, it is as if you have saved the whole world. I would go even further by stating that if you preserve that which is sacred and has meaning, it is as if you have guaranteed the future and ensured continuity. That is the debt we owe to those who were responsible for our existence as a congregation and the preservation of our heritage. Hanukkah means dedication, and what better example of dedication than remembering our past which brought us to today.

The Talmud also teaches that if a community is in need, a person must not stay uninvolved. A person must share in the communities' needs, and they will see its survival guaranteed. The continuity of the generations will be the testament to that involvement.

Yes, Hanukkah means many things, but to me the most significant is that our destiny is enshrined in our connection to each other and to God, who enables us to make each season a season of joy and fulfillment.



Don't Let the Lights Go Out

"Don't let the lights go out!" With these words, over 2200 years ago, humanity was introduced to an awareness that illuminates the path of life's journey.

Hanukkah represents the globalization of the understanding of God. The light that emanates from the Menorah is the light of the true meaning of the relationship between God and humanity. Hanukkah comes at a time when darkness surrounds us. Days are short. Nights are long. It is cold and the harshness of winter is beginning. Life withers. We sleep. Yes, this is the darkest time of the year.

Then there is light. The warm glow of the candles kindles an awareness in our hearts that radiates so strongly and embraces everything around us. We are mesmerized by the flame, almost hypnotized, and we feel secure. Each night we light another candle until all eight are lit. And each night we feel a new sense of enlightenment, a new level of holiness, a new attempt at the connection between God and humanity.

We light eight candles to differentiate between the Creator and the created. For in six days did God bring order from chaos and rested on the seventh, and we, on the eighth day, attempt to bring this order into our daily lives through the miracle of the lights.

We cannot recapture the past, but we can use it to ensure the future. The religious freedom that was won has been the clarion call for all people throughout history. Every battle for religious freedom has had

as its foundation the spark from the candles lit to indicate that good survived.

May the light of freedom glow for all humanity.

May the light of hope give meaning to our journey through life.

May the light of redemption enable us to fulfill our destiny.

May the light of Hanukkah remain a symbol for the future for everyone.

May the light illuminate the paths of darkness as it awakens our souls to our societal duties.

May the light remind us that there is goodness in each of us.

May the light help us to remember our responsibility to comfort the oppressed; encourage the downtrodden.

May the light remind us to respond to those in trouble as we attempt to relieve their pain and suffering.

May the light remind us that tomorrow can be better and that life is cherished and above all it is to be honored.

At our Shabbat Services on December 12, we will once again join together to commemorate this dramatic experience that has given us the ability to enhance our lives through the miracle of LIGHT.


A NEW YEAR OF EXPERIMENTATIONS

FRIENDS OF ISRAEL

AN IMMIGRATION NATION

Diversity of the Israeli population with a focus on immigration and absorption was the topic of the most recent Friends of Israel, SLJC, speakers' series. Two Israeli women who represent the Jewish Agency in Greater Phoenix spoke about their life experiences coming from immigrant families. Sapir is the Senior Shlicha (Israel Emissary) at the Jewish Philanthropy of Greater Phoenix and Pardes Jewish Day School, and Vita is the Israel Fellow at ASU Hillel. Sapir's family are Mizrachi, while Vita moved to Israel from Russia at age 16.

They both highlighted the rich cultural variations that exist in Israel with some obstacles from certain groups not fully appreciating the potential contributions of newly arriving immigrants. All arriving groups, however, quicky develop a sense of belonging and a national spirit. National emergencies and threats to security are met with a predictable unification and sense of a singular purpose.

The large waves of Russian Immigrants were initially labelled as "Sausages" because many could not prove their personal Jewish heritage and were felt to be taking advantage of visas to Israel being available. 1.75 million Russian/Ukrainians have arrived in Israel since 1948.

Mizrachi Jews were initially felt to be uneducated, compared to European Jews, with little to contribute to

the general welfare. But Mizrachi Jews now comprise the majority of the Jewish population in Israel. There are now 10.15 million citizens in Israel, with 78.8% being Jewish and 21.5% being Arabs.

Both immigrating groups have made substantial strides in terms of acceptance, government service and industrial leadership, while others still struggle. All immigrants retain their cultural uniqueness, cuisine and lifestyles, with a high level of comfort.

LONE SOLDIER PROJECT

IMMIGRANTS' (OLIM) ROLE IN ISRAEL'S WAR AGAINST TERRORISTS ON SEVEN FRONTS SINCE OCTOBER 7, 2023S

According to data published by the Immigration, Absorption, and Diaspora Committee in January 2023, 6, 973 Lone Soldiers were serving in the Israeli army, 88% of them immigrants. Typically, 7000-7500 Lone Soldiers are on active duty at any one time, half from foreign countries and half Israelis.

Meanwhile, 13,000 Lone Soldier reservists (reservists who originally did their regular army service as Lone Soldiers) served in Israel's war in Gaza between October 7, 2023 and December 2024.

However, according to the US-based Friends of the IDF, the number is much higher. It confirmed that 20,000 Americans have participated in the war from its inception to the present day as Lone Soldiers. (Excerpted from The New Arab)

The physical and emotional toll on IDF soldiers has been enormous. Our Lone Soldiers Center partners have been overwhelmed with mental health service requests. The IDF reports that well over 10,000 of all soldiers have been formallyiagnosed with PTSD.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

IEWISH POWS

When Operation Homecoming (the return of U.S. POWs from Vietnam between February and April 1973) occurred, Americans were joyful at the repatriation. Yet it is likely that you did not know that five of those POWs were lewish and that one more converted several years later. I only learned this fact by reading "Hanoi's Jewish Prisoners of War," written by Sheldon Goldberg, Ph.D. and Lt. Col. USAF (Retired) in the Fall issue of Mig Sweep. Dr. Goldberg flew combat missions in Vietnam in the F-4D aircraft. He is the Docent/Historian at the National Museum of American Jewish Military History in Washington, D.C.

The first Jewish-American captured was Airman 2nd Class Arthur Niel Black, who was shot down in his HH-43B helicopter in September 1965. He was given a field commission while in captivity; upon returning to the U.S., he completed pilot training and retired as a Major.

Air Force 1st Lt. Al Brudno was shot down in his F-4C in October 1965. Lt. Brudno was an MIT graduate and taught math and physics to other prisoners, despite being the subject of numerous tortures. He was severely depressed in captivity and, sadly, PTSD led him to commit suicide four months after his repatriation.

Alan Lurie, Major USAF, was captured in June 1966, when his F-4C was brought down. He remained in the Air Force after coming home, retired as a Brigadier



Photo credit: https://nmajmh.org/2025/09/hanois-jewish-prisoners-of-war/ General, and passed away in 2017. Another F-4 pilot who remained in the USAF after repatriation was Captain Mel Pollack. He overcame severe back injuries and returned to flying status, retiring as a Lt. Col.

Army Capt. Hal Kushner, M.D., was captured by the Viet Cong when his helicopter crashed in 1967. Despite being wounded, he survived imprisonment, returned to active duty and retired as a Colonel.

Air Force Capt. Chuck Jackson was shot down in his F-4 by an air-to-air missile in June 1972. He remained on active duty for five years but was medically retired in 1979 due to injuries suffered in his 1972 ejection. Chuck converted to Judaism after he retired and became a life member of the Jewish War Veterans. He passed away in August of this year.



JWV SPEAKER OFFERS HELP TO BRAIN INJURED VETS AND PUBLIC

Tom Eiseminger, a U. S. Army veteran, and President of the Arizona Veterans' Medical Leadership Council, will be the featured speaker at our next meeting. Complimentary lox, bagels, donuts, and coffee will be served at 9:30 am. The

meeting follows at 10 am.

The Veterans' Medical Leadership Council (VMLC), a nonprofit organization, exists to "stop the spiral" toward veteran suicide through "upstream prevention," according to Eiseminger. A lifelong advocate for those who have served, Tom has made it his mission to bridge the gap between military service and successful civilian life. He works closely with public and private partners across Arizona to ensure veterans receive the respect, resources, and rapid support they deserve.

Founded in 1999, its mission is to support the veterans of the Greater Phoenix Valley who have a need which is outside the scope of what the Veterans' Administration, the State of Arizona and other Federal and State offices. The VMLC works in concert with all possible organizations to meet Arizona veterans' needs.

Working in conjunction with VA Social Workers in Phoenix and Prescott, the VMLC identifies veterans on the verge of losing their jobs or homes and provides immediate financial assistance to stabilize their lives. In many cases, a few hundred dollars for rent, utilities, or car repairs can make the difference between stability and tragedy. "Our payments can be made same day the temporary hardship is identified, making us a unique and responsive non-profit within the veteran's community," explains Tom. According to Kristy S., LCSW, Mental Health Treatment Coordinator of the Phoenix VA Healthcare System, "Social workers can provide only so much support to our veterans in need, and financial assistance is usually not available; so, it feels incredible to have the VLMC as an amazing resource to offer."

Founded by veterans for veterans, the VMLC has been a trusted partner to Arizona's veteran community for over two decades. In 2026, the organization plans to expand its program to the VA Medical Center in Tucson. In addition to his role with the VMLC, Tom serves as the President & CEO at Regenesis Biomedical, a medical device company focused on improving patients' lives and reducing pain — a passion that aligns closely with his advocacy for veterans' health and well-being.

JWV Post 619, which meets the third Sunday of every month from September to June, boasts members who represent a wide range of religious affiliations and participates in philanthropic activities to help veterans of all faiths. JWV PAST COMMANDER INDUCTED INTO ARIZONA VETERANS' HALL OF FAME

Arthur Sharf, Past Commander of Jewish War Veterans Copper State Post 619 (JWV) of Sun Lakes, was one of 15 outstanding veterans inducted into the Arizona Veterans' Hall of Fame (AVHOF) by Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs and John Scott, Director of Arizona Department of Veterans' Services. The event, held October 24th at the Talking Stick Resort Conference Center in Scottsdale, recognizes veterans of the U.S. military who have made Arizona their home and have made significant professional or volunteer contributions to their community, state, or nation.

Stationed in the Panama Canal, Art served with U.S. Army Military Police from 1969 -1971. He then returned to his hometown, Rochester, NY, where he worked for Kodak and joined the Knights of Pythias. There he raised thousands of dollars to support local charities, including those that helped disadvantaged children. One program that stands out in his mind was a camp for children undergoing cancer treatment.

Art remained loyal to the lodge and maintained his membership even after leaving New York in 2003 to come to Arizona. In 2007, he joined Jewish War Veterans Post 619 in Sun Lakes, AZ and quickly became Jr. Vice Commander. He served as Senior Vice Commander 2008-2009 and Post Commander 2010-2011, served on the Board 2007-2015, and chaired the Poppy Drive 2015-2020 when he was diagnosed with lymphoma, which he is still battling.

Sharf received numerous awards and honors from JWV Post 619 for his volunteer work. In April 2024, he received a Lifetime Service Award "for long-term commitment to help disadvantaged veterans." Specific innovative programs he implemented were "meal" events to have post members serve food to the veterans at the Arizona State Veterans' Home, US Vets, MANA House, and the VA Mental Health Clinic. These events inspire the membership to participate in JWV's Poppy Drive, which raises thousands of dollars yearly to support critical services and events for the vets.

Art received the IWV Person of the Year award in March 2015 for his contributions to and modernization of the

post's primary fundraiser Poppy Drive at eight Fry's Market locations. He then assisted the post as it distributed funds, ensuring that the nonprofit organizations receiving money were wise investments and helping find new worthy veteran-focused organizations in need of financial aid.

Art's volunteer work was primarily focused on helping support struggling vets, especially those at risk with substance abuse issues, dealing with homelessness, hospitalization, etc. His unyielding goal was to help vets get back on their feet and live their best lives when dealing with obstacles and disabilities.

The JROTC program at Hamilton High, established by Sharf, which supports cadets travelling to the Air Force Academy, was recently resurrected in 2025 by the post. Cadets now participate in JWV ceremonies and events and have attended post meetings.





Literary Ladies Book Group


