

Another New Year

No matter how we calculate the passage of time, whether we consider the first of January or the first of Tishrei as the New Year, the beginning of a year is always a time to pause, to reflect, and to contemplate.

Tishrei (Rosh Hashanah) represents a rededication of our spiritual self. January is designed to give us a chance to think of our relationships. Then there is Tu Bishvat, the New Year of the trees, and Passover, the New Year of our birth as a nation and a people – our religious maturity, if you will.

All can be summed up with a favorite quote from the rabbis of Yavneh: "I am a creation of God, and my neighbor is also a creation of God; my work is in the city and his in the field; I rise early to do my work and he rises early to do his. As he cannot do well at my work; similarly, I cannot do well at his work. Nevertheless, if you say, I do great things and he does unimportant things, I respond: We have learned that it does not matter if a person does much or little, but only if he directs his heart to heaven."

Perhaps what the rabbis of Yavneh were trying to say is that we need to care about each other, to be concerned about one another. This is the essence of who we are – our character – our respect for the dignity of all humans and animals as well.

All who toil in this vineyard of caring exemplify these teachings.

How do we accomplish this in everyday living? Quite simply by being who we are – human beings created to imitate the goodness of God. And each New Year that is celebrated, whether secular or religious, gives us the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to doing for others.

Yes, we have a New Year for trees because we know that nature and humankind work together to make life livable and rewarding. And just as trees sleep in the winter and are reborn in the spring, we too can garner our strength to bring renewal to our existence after the cold winter passes.

Then we turn the page, and it is February. Usually this is a dull month in the cycle of life because December, with all its celebrations, also carries into January. But February seems to be lost in the shuffle.

Hold the presses – we do have things to commemorate and celebrate in February:

Valentine's Day – a day designated for love and affection. Perhaps we should consider making every day a Valentine's Day. Love is not for a moment, but for a lifetime. In an instant we love and then in an instant we forget to love. It matters not how this holiday got started. We need it as a reminder that love is the glue that keeps us connected.

President's Day – a day designated for us to remember the contributions made for our survival and continuity that are represented by the people we elect to lead us into the future as a people and nation, and to remember the sacrifices of those who helped get us to this time in our lives.

Black History Month – a time designated for us to consider equality and the brotherhood of man as mandated in Scripture. To teach about the evils of prejudice and the values of understanding every person's needs for connection and acceptance.

Each of these observances has a common thread – dignity. Elsewhere in this edition of the Shpiel I have suggested support for a noble venture instituted by our people to follow the instruction given to us in a certain Torah reading. After reading it, please determine that it is a worthwhile effort for our continuing support.

So, dull February is not so dull after all. There are things to consider and to fulfill our dream for a tranquil life. $\stackrel{2}{\doteq}$

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

JAKE RETZLAFF By Murray Siegel


Almost 99% of the students attending Brigham Young University are Mormon, yet the star quarterback of the BYU football team, Jake Retzlaff, is Jewish. Not only that, Jake has a contract where he will get paid to have his image on special edition boxes of Manischewitz matzos. Jake was raised in California where his family belonged to a Reform temple in Pomona.

Jake is the first athlete to sign a deal with Manischewitz and the amount he is being paid has not been revealed. The boxes will be sold through Passover. When asked about his experience with the company's products, he said, "Manischewitz has always been part of my life. I grew up with matzo with peanut butter as my favorite snack, and every Passover, my family and I made matzo pizza together. At Hanukkah time our tradition was making potato latkes."

Jake was the number one rated junior college quarterback at Riverside City College and transferred to BYU in January 2023. He is one of only three Jewish students attending Brigham Young and proudly wears a Star of David to demonstrate in public his devotion to his faith.



LONE SOLDIER PROJECT LONE SOLDIERS SUFFER FROM POST TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER



Recent reports highlight the extent of post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) among IDF soldiers who have been in combat and the challenge for the IDF to respond to this massive need. Two groups are particularly vulnerable to this consequence of war: Lone Soldiers and Reservists. Lone Soldiers are vulnerable because they do not have immediate families available to provide intermittent emotional support, and Reservists because they do not want to burden their wives and parents by talking about their stress and feelings. "Lone Reservist" is a newly coined term.

Lt.-Col. Dr. Michal Lipshitz, head of the IDF's psychiatric department, said the IDF's mental health system has been expanded to approximately 800 therapists: "We established a new branch during the war that provides support for soldiers with post-traumatic symptoms."

Our three Lone Soldier Center partners have each enhanced their support role with therapists specifically trained to prevent and treat PTSD. Hagar Gerich Shahaf of the Michael Levin BASE Center says, "Many Lone Soldiers approached us and said they needed treatment, but they didn't have the option of doing it privately because it was expensive. So, we established the mental health care system. We have amazing therapists, and we know how to connect the soldiers to therapists and provide an immediate response." A 2024 midyear report indicated that requests from recently discharged soldiers have surged by approximately 50%, while demands for mental health assistance have risen by about 60%.

Chayal el Chayal Lone Soldier Center held a Shabbaton in August 2024 for 15 Lone Soldiers that were serving in Gaza. They were treated to a well-deserved resort that helped them relax with the aid of professional therapists teaching them techniques to release their tension. More of these essential therapeutic events are planned.



JWV is a significant

contributor to U.S. Vets Phoenix which is dedicated to ending veterans' homelessness, assisting those who have served our country. They do this by providing transitional housing and support to strengthen U.S. vet independence.

Along with transitional housing, their services include mental health counseling, career development, transportation, and case management. Weekly offsite activities such as sports games, gym sessions, community dinners, and events assist veterans with improving their quality of life and strengthening their independence.

Additionally, U.S. Vets Phoenix manages Ashley's Place, two five-bedroom homes specifically for female survivors of Military Sexual Trauma.

Michelle is excited to tell JWV about their U.S. Vets anticipated relocation in April to their new site at the Hawkins Veterans Center, situated off I-17 and Cactus. This facility will significantly expand their capacity to serve veterans in need. When its renovation is complete, the facility will include 103 single rooms, 47 doubles, and 13 female rooms accommodating up to 163 veterans.

Once completed, the new location will also feature a commercial kitchen, gym, and their popular clothing closet for free clothing and essential supplies, made possible through generous community donations. "We're especially grateful for the regular support we get from Post 619," says Michelle. "Clothing drives, like the one JWV held last month, excite our veterans and keep our closet stocked. We are always open to contributions," concludes the Director.

Michelle was recognized by the Senior White House Advisor to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs for her collaboration in the Military/Veteran Community Network. She is an accomplished and transformational leader in the nonprofit sector. Her contributions throughout her remarkable career have garnered her numerous awards, including the 2020 Arizona Public Service Inspirational Leadership Award, Certificate of Special Congressional Recognition, and the 2018 Lincoln Award from the Southwest Veterans Chamber of Commerce.
