When We Remember – Yom HaShoah

So much has been written about the Holocaust. And yet, not enough.

Torah Scrolls were burned and destroyed, because they are the repositories of truth and truth is the mortal enemy of evil. Evil cannot exist where

there is purity and faithfulness as represented on these parchments of history.

And we are left to remain witnesses to the fact that truth cannot be substituted by madness. Only complacency can hide the truth from us and even distort it. Only the willingness of the family of man can cause truth to be manipulated, but never eradicated. Truth is the one weave in the fabric of humanity that is eternal.

The Torah Scrolls were destroyed because the letters of each word represent the souls of every human being sacrificed and burned. And as each image disappeared, a little bit of God disappeared as well because we were created in the Divine image.

Our possession of one of the Scrolls redeemed is a reminder of this undisputable fact: We survived and will continue to survive. Each soul has been reunited with the One who gave us truth and has become a testament to the cruelty and inhumanity only we are capable of.

We are here to not only remain witnesses, but also to continue trying to make sense of it all. We are also left to remember because that is a holy mission. To remember is part of the understanding of the tragic episode it represents. If we remember, then perhaps the horrors of yesterday will not be repeated. There is no one answer, there is no one explanation that can sufficiently bring closure to this darkest time in history.

How can this chapter ever be closed? Forgetting certainly would desecrate the memory of those who have no one to say prayers, or light candles, or tell of their lives. Their immortality is woven into the belief that their souls are bound up in a common bond of weeping that can be heard around the world and in the Heavens where God and the Angels are constantly mourning their loss. Each year as we commemorate this dreadful episode, we can hear, if we listen very carefully, the Angels calling out the names of those who are now nothing but scattered ashes; or mutilated bones that never burned; or human flesh rotting in the sun, all in unmarked graves in the earth soaked with their blood.

And God listens to each name, to each memory and repeats the immortal words described in Scripture: "I have seen the affliction of my people and will set them free. I shall lead them to the Promised Land of hope and the future will hold their redemption and salvation."

Each time we remember, we resurrect a soul which symbolizes the rebirth of values, and benevolence, and blessing.

Thus, on May 11 we will hold our annual Yom HaShoah Remembrance service in conjunction with our regular Sabbath service. The doors of the Chapel will open at 6:30 pm, giving everyone the opportunity to light a candle in memory of those who perished in this unimaginable nightmare. Our service will begin, as usual, at 7 pm.

Members of our congregation, survivors of the Holocaust, will stand and light six candles in eternal memory of the six million martyrs that were sacrificed on the altar of bigotry and hatred that, to this day, staggers the imagination.

A special candle will be lit in memory of the one and one half million children who perished with their parents and relatives. Another special candle will be lit honoring the memory of the Righteous Gentiles who ignored their safety to assist in the rescue of so many of our people.

Our Cantor and choir will offer special prayers and we will, as a congregation, stand together and recite the ancient words of the Kaddish prayer to fulfill the promise "Never to Forget."

And as these words are uttered, if we listen carefully, we will hear God and the Angels whisper their names.

May all their memories remain a blessing for all of us.



SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

EVAN GERSHKOVICH By Murray Siegel


Evan Gershkovich has been in the news, including being on the cover of the March 25th issue of *TIME* magazine. Evan is a *Wall Street Journal* reporter who was arrested in Russia on espionage charges more than a year ago. The American government and the *Wall Street Journal* have stated that he was not a spy, but his imprisonment persists.

What you might not know is that Evan is Jewish. In fact, his parents, Mikhail and Ella, emigrated from the Soviet Union, separately in 1979. Both gave their reason for leaving as "seeking to escape rising antisemitism and life under Soviet rule." The couple met in Brooklyn in the 1980s, were married, and raised a family in New Jersey.

Evan was arrested while meeting a source at a restaurant in Yekaterinburg, an important economic center located about 1,000 miles east of Moscow. He is the first American journalist accused of espionage since the end of the Cold War.



Putin has expressed an interest in a prisoner swap, but analysts believe that the U.S. does not hold any high value Russian prisoners who might be used in a swap for Evan. Evan has been allowed to write to his family and friends, but there is no evidence that he can be expected home soon. His next court appearance has been scheduled for June.



JEWISH WAR VETERANS COPPER STATE POST 619 JWV SPEAKER TELLS HOW STUDENTS INTERVIEW VETERANS FOR THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

Sunday, May 19, 9:30 am, Poolside Building, Oakwood Country Club, 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd., Sun Lakes

Speaker Hannah Nichols, Project Coordinator for Veterans Heritage Program (VHP), will explain how students are connected to veterans to honor them, preserve America's heritage, and develop future leaders. The Jewish War Veterans (JWV) meeting will be held on Sunday, May 19 in the Poolside Building at Oakwood Country Club, 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd. in Sun Lakes. A "Meet & Greet," with FREE lox and bagels, coffee, and doughnuts starts at 9:30 am. The speaker follows at 10 am. All are welcome.

VHP facilitates an after-school program in 30 local schools with dedicated teacher advisors. Veterans' first-person accounts of their history are preserved as students conduct recorded interviews which are sent to the Library of Congress. The student then writes the veteran's story for publication in the annual book, "Since You Asked." The book includes war and peacetime service stories from veterans of all eras or service branches.

Ms. Nichols explains the process: "Our students have questions for the veterans and are excited to listen and learn. Veterans share that they feel honored and appreciated in the interview process. 20% of our veterans are opening up and sharing their story for the first time ever. Many report that the emotional processing of their service story, its meaning and significance, and the impact on their life and career, is cathartic and therapeutic."

Post 619 member, Gabe Forsberg, was interviewed for the 2023 volume of SYATM by Cactus Shadows High School student Cole Diefenderfer. The student shared, "I learned a lot from my veteran, including community service, which was a major part of her service. I am incorporating service into my life and wish to expand my efforts as I get older."

Nickey Page, 12th grade English Teacher, Payson High School, confirms, "this program means so much more than what you think it will when you start out. The impact it has on the students and the veterans is something that will stay with you forever."


Ms. Nichols notes, "The culmination of our program is the annual Community Reception and Book



Signing, where you witness the pride of our students and veterans, and the bonds they have formed. Generations are bridged, and students develop a deeper understanding of service, sacrifice, and citizenship."

Veterans attending the JWV meeting will have an opportunity to sign up to be added to the VHP interview waiting list. Others may go to their website www. veteransheritage.org/veterans to complete an online form. Interviews are typically conducted in the fall.

JWV Post 619, which meets the third Sunday of every month from September to May, boasts members who represent a wide range of religious affiliations and participate in philanthropic activities to help veterans of all faiths. Volunteers are especially needed in May for JWV's Memorial Day Poppy Campaign at Fry's Food Stores and Mesa Market Place. 
