Fifty years ago, a song was introduced that became an instant hit. It's title, "What the World Needs Now." were given a

What the World Needs Now

It caught on for several reasons, but I believe the words ring true today, more than ever. All we need do is turn our TVs on and

witness the madness that surrounds us. No longer is it necessary for the media to create sensationalism to create a following. We are the characters in an ongoing epic of melodrama and mayhem.

Read the words and listen to the melody. You will find the accurate cry of the generations past and the hope, as well as the despair, of today:

"What the world needs now is love, sweet love, It's the only thing that there's just too little of; What the world needs now is love, sweet love, No, not just for some, but for everyone."

Imagine the lament of a parent who witnesses the senseless death of a child caught in the quagmire of hate. Hear the cry of people taken from their homes and indiscriminately slaughtered because their beliefs differ from their murderers. Watch the planes drop bombs on cities and dwellings causing panic and displacement. Witness the world pontificating about issues that are far removed from reality.

Today, more than ever, we sit in our comfortable homes and stare at pictures of atrocities only read about a generation ago. The glamour of conflict has disappeared and has been replaced by the actuality of the gory details. Extremism has replaced common decency. We no longer think in terms of "Peace on Earth, good will toward men." This has become a momentary slogan followed the next day by sameness.

Is one life worth more than the other? Do some deserve to live, and others die just to satisfy the living? There is enough mercy and justice for all, not just for a few. Look around, if you dare. What do you see?

Our fields are now strewn with bodies. Our meadows are soaked with the blood of the innocent. The lights of heaven are clouded with the smoke of bombs and cannons. The rainbow, which was sent to remind us of God's compassion, has added a black stream in mourning for civilization's ability to destroy rather than perpetuate. We ask God to listen to our cry, but we are the ones who do not hear the sounds of bitterness.

During the most heinous period in human history (World War II), the question was asked, "Where was God?" And the answer given, "Where was Man?" Where are we? Where are we going? We have forgotten that what the world needs now is love, sweet love. It's the only thing that's there just too little of...No, not just for some, but for everyone."

As we begin a New Year, it is my prayer that we will find peace and good fortune at the end of the rainbow. Hopefully the year 5785 will mark the beginning of a new birth of freedom: freedom from death and destruction, freedom from hate and vitriol, freedom from the fear of religious intolerance, and freedom from the extremism that has permeated our societies.

I pray for our country. I pray for those in harm's way. I pray for Israel as it struggles to remain a stronghold for our people. I pray for the men and women who serve our country in both peace and war. I pray for our community as it continues to offer comfort and solace to so many. Most of all, I pray that God hears our cries for help in bringing order back to our lives. Shanah tovah!

Remembrance By Rabbi Irwin Wiener, D.D.

There are times established for us to remember loved ones, times to recount the good and the bad moments that were the total of their journey here on Earth. Our remembrance will ensure immortality for all whom we love and miss. The time I refer to is designated as *yahrzeit*. We light a candle, think about what was, and hope that the flame that burns will remain with us for all time, even as it eventually extinguishes.

Life is like that candle as it illuminates the path to tomorrow. When the flame disappears, there is no darkness. Rather, there is the continuing search for light: the light of eternal peace, the light of eternal reward, the light that leads to oneness with God.

Each person we remember came to us through the generosity of a loving God. We shared precious moments and inherited fond memories as legacies. Each life was precious, filled with dreams and frustrations, hopes and despairs.

Death helps us understand creation. We are born, we live, we learn, we endure, and then we are no more. FRIENDS OF ISRAEL "HONEST REPORTING" CHIEF CONCLUDES ISRAEL SERIES

Mr. Gil Hoffman, Executive Editor of the Pro-Israel media watchdog from Israel, will speak on: "Peace, Politics and Propaganda: An Insider's Look at the Fight for Israel on the Military and Media Battlefields." He served for 24 years as chief political correspondent and analyst for *The Jerusalem Post*, where he is now a regular columnist. The Algemeiner website recently named him one of the top 100 people positively influencing Jewish life, alongside presidents, prime ministers and Jewish leaders. Rabbi Mikael Beyo began the series, laying the historical foundation for modern events by reviewing the geographical, religious, cultural and military features of radical Muslims in Israel. He noted that they are supported by outside radicals determined to eliminate the state of Israel, leading to the past "76 years of conflict and intermittent wars.

Mr. Hoffman will focus on the current war and how Israel must fight these radical elements as well as international media who for a variety of reasons are chronically critical of Israel, which dramatically biases their news reporting.

Talent is always great, but having fun and laughing together is what this is all about!





SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

AMIT ELOR By Murray Siegel

If you were watching the Paris Olympics, you might have seen Amit Elor win a gold medal for the United States in women's freestyle wrestling in the 68-kg class. At 20 years of age, Amit was the youngest American, either male or female, to win an Olympic gold medal in wrestling.

Amit was born and raised in Walnut Creek, CA and currently is studying applied mathematics and psychology at Diablo Valley College. Both grandfathers were Holocaust survivors who emigrated to Israel. Her parents, Yair and Elana, came to the U.S. when Yair accepted an athletic scholarship to Boise State University in Idaho, to compete in the shot put and discus throw.

Amit spoke only Hebrew until she attended preschool and began wrestling at age four. In 2019, she received the California High School Champion of Champions award. At the Olympics, she outpointed the 2023 reigning world champion Buse Tosun Çavuşoğlu of Turkey in the first round (10-2), three-time European U23 champion Wiktoria Chołuj of Poland in the second round (8-0),



Pak Sol-gum of North Korea in the semi-finals (10-0), and 2021 world champion Meerim Zhumanazarova of Kyrgyzstan in the finals (3-0).

After the gold medal victory, Amit received antisemitic and pro-Hamas messages on social media. Her response was, "Eighty years ago my grandparents survived the Holocaust, but antisemitism is still all around us. My grandparents won. I won. Humanity will win. Never Again."

JEWISH WAR VETERANS COPPER STATE POST 619 JWV SPEAKER HELPS VETERANS IN NEED DURING OFF HOURS

Marcus Lamar Brown, founder and president of Veterans 5-9, will explain how his organization helps veterans after hours when he speaks to Jewish War Veterans Post 619 on Sunday, October 20. The meeting takes place in **Bradford Room A** at Oakwood Country Club, 24218 S. Oakwood Blvd in Sun Lakes. A "Meet & Greet," with FREE lox and bagels, coffee, and doughnuts starts at 9:30 am. The speaker follows at 10 am. All are welcome. (Please note venue!)

The Veterans 5-9 provides nighttime and weekend support services to veterans currently in the military or exiting soon and reintegrating from incarceration. Options Veterans 5-9 includes resources for substance abuse, mental health, food, lodging, and transportation, which are normally only available on weekdays during normal business hours. When the 5 o'clock hour/ weekend hits, service providers aren't available, and veterans are left to fend for themselves.

To help accomplish their mission, Veterans 5-9 partners with various ground-level organizations. "All of our partners have a wealth of resources and talented members ready to help," states Brown. "Our streamlined process means veterans are assisted immediately and not just told to call another number. The overall goal is to immediately stop the emergency, and work on long term resources to ensure you get over the hump," Brown tells the veterans. To ensure the veteran has a strong support group, Veterans 5-9 provides a comprehensive follow up system to provide continuity as they stabilize and rebuild their lives.


Brown provided a perfect example of how 5-9 works. He was at a spring training game when he got a call from a constable who had to evict a veteran. "The constable gave him our number to call saying we might be able to assist him. I immediately left the game, put this now homeless veteran in a hotel for a night, and provided food for him and his cat. The next day we assisted with paying all eviction fees to get him right back into the same apartment. This veteran was very appreciative that he was not left behind," concluded Brown.

Marcus Brown is a native of Casa Grande, Arizona, growing up playing sports and hoping one day to make it to the Olympics for track & field. After 9/11, he decided to join the Marine Corps in 2004, completing two tours to the Middle East as a part of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom. "I was taught to never leave anyone behind," claims Brown. "Our work is so impactful because we work to accomplish this every day."
