We Need God More Than Ever

There is no absolute proof of the existence of God. All beliefs are based upon faith. God has provided enough clues. However, each of us must arrive at our own conclusions because God is personal as well as universal.

And yet, I wonder, even if

there were proof, would we still question God's existence? There have always been doubters and deniers and it became the norm to question when we entered the Age of Reason. God had to be proven.

From the very beginning we have also questioned the purpose that God had for all of us. What was the purpose of creation? What is the purpose of humanity?

It is not hard to deny the existence of God. There is war and killing. There is famine and desolation. There is crime and tragedy. There is sickness and despair. Innocent people die and evil people don't.

And then there is the question of evil. How do we reconcile evil and God at the same time? Why would God put evil in front of us if the intention was to bring the harmony of heaven to Earth? If there is God, why all the suffering?

There have always been questions dating back to Abraham as he dialogues with God regarding the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah.

And yet, I suggest that it is not hard to believe. There is beauty in nature. There is orderliness of the seasons. There is complexity as well as simplicity. There is the ability to create and enjoy what has been created added by our own hands and with our own thoughts. There is the capacity to love and be loved.

Can we ever be close to God, and talk to God? Do we really believe even though we cannot see? I believe the answer is a resounding yes. We talk to God through prayer and deed. We reason with God by seeking answers to complex questions. We see God through our connection with each other.

But there are also no absolute answers. However, I suggest that the answers lie somewhere in the concept of free will. God essentially gave humanity the ability to choose. We, in essence, are responsible for our decisions given the choices.

God, perhaps, hopes that we will choose the right path so that we will derive comfort.

I would also suggest that we ask the wrong questions. We should not be asking why or what or where. What we should be asking is how - how do we, humankind, relieve the suffering and the misery and the pain? How do we, the family of man, come together, as the master plan of creation was designed, to comfort and sustain and live together?

The miracles we seek lie in the ability to survive. Hope in the goodness of the human spirit is another weapon we possess that will bring us ever closer to our Creator. There is a partnership. God's part was accomplished by giving us the tools to be self-sufficient and our part is to take these signs and wonders and apply them to a survival kit and then acknowledge the God who partnered with us.

There is no straight path to God. There are glitches and detours and speed bumps. The destination is the essential expression of our connection. Labels are not the answer to finding God. There should be sincerity of purpose and the realization that as we are different, one to the other, so is the journey we embark upon as we continue to seek unity with God.

This, in essence is what Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur represent: the eternal search for God. We gather, and through this experience we hope that our expressions will not only reach its ultimate destination, but that the words and the thoughts will give us the comfort we so desperately need in these trying times.

As we prepare to begin a **New** chapter in our journey, it is my prayer that together we will find the comfort and the fulfillment needed to sustain us and bring peace into our lives.

Join us at Shabbat services on September 13 – 7:00pm. The New journey begins with the Selichot prayers ushering in the days of renewal. We need each other more than ever, and we need God even more.

The holidays are coming and it is already time for the 2024 Lone Soldier Hanukkah Greeting Campaign. This effort started at SLIC and now involves 50 sites around the state. SLIC continues to be one of the most involved. Thank you!

The October 7th Hamas atrocities and the resulting war has created enormous stress for the IDF and the entire country. Lone Soldiers are being pushed beyond imagination, putting their safety and survival at risk daily for nine months. The Michael Levin Lone Soldier Center reports: "Requests from recently discharged soldiers have surged by approximately 50%, while demands for mental health assistance have risen by about 60%. Lone soldiers, in particular, require our support in preparing for combat and coping with post-traumatic stress. Many of them have lost friends or experienced the traumatic events of Oct 7th, highlighting their need for professional guidance to navigate these challenging times."

Lone Soldiers love receiving our greetings because they tell them that their challenging role in the IDF is doing something much bigger than themselves and that Jews in

"No veteran should experience homelessness" is the mainstay of The Catholic Charities MANA (Marines, Army, Navy, Air Force) House which provides transitional housing and support for veterans experiencing homelessness and helps them find permanent housing. MANA House holds up to 76 male veterans at a time, graduating from 5 to 10 residents per month.

At MANA House, a peer-run organization, veterans find a safe place to start over. They receive personalized case management that may include career counseling, job placement, assistance with Social Security and Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits, educational programs, volunteer job opportunities, connections to healthcare, and more. This support gives each veteran the opportunity to reclaim a life of self-sufficiency.

Most veterans move into a studio or one-bedroom apartment upon leaving MANA House. They are ecstatic to have a stable income and a place to call their own. Moving into an empty apartment is expensive, however. Fortunately, MANA House provides Welcome Home kits containing cleaning supplies and other items costing from \$50-\$100 each. "We want the veterans to save as much of their money as possible to spend on things that are more important to them," according to Mrs. Masch-Perez, who creates the kits. A Veteran recently expressed to Mrs. Masch-Perez how attending a Diamondbacks game, with tickets generously donated, helped him overcome his social anxiety, boosted his morale, and allowed him to come out of his shell and make new friends.





SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

STEVEN HILL By Murray Siegel

If you watched the first ten seasons of Law and Order, you know that Steven Hill played New York County District Attorney Adam Schiff. You might not know that Steven lost a TV job because he was an Orthodox Jew. In 1966, Steven played Dan Briggs during the initial year of Mission Impossible – his character sent the team on their weekly missions. Because he could not stay late on Friday, Steven was not invited to return for a second season. He had made it clear that he would not work on his Sabbath, yet the producers were frustrated by his inability to stay past sundown on Friday, and they replaced him with Peter Graves.

Steven Hill was born Solomon Krakovsky in 1922 to a family of Russian Jewish immigrants in Seattle. He served in the Navy during World War II, graduated from the University of Washington, and moved to Chicago to begin a career in acting. He relocated to New York where he studied at the Actors Studio, sharing classes with Marlon Brando, Montgomery Clift and Julie Harris.



He worked on Broadway, in movies and on television. His work on Law and Order led to an Emmy nomination. Steven was married twice and had a total of nine children. He died in 2016 at the age of 94.
