



Membership Renewal

Message from Our Rabbi

Another Year

It seems that time escapes us no matter how we try to hold on to it. It is as though we blink, and in that instant we travel to another time and place. Was it yesterday when we were young and full of life? Perhaps it was a moment ago when we were accomplishing things unreachable today. Regardless, here we are in a New Year. Hopefully it will be a year filled with many achievements and fulfillments.

A New Year gives us the opportunity to not only cast off the past but look forward to the future as well. Our responsibility to the betterment of society can and should be part of that awareness. Volunteerism is a part of that determination essential to make a better place for all of us, as we develop relationships and forge alliances in human relationships.

Some of us get involved in charitable efforts that enhance our ability to repair the tear in a world that is so fragile that one turn in any direction can lead to disastrous consequences. And there are some who combine their talents to forge a new link in the chain of Jewish survival by walking into the Synagogue, rolling up their sleeves and digging right into Jewish life with a commitment of time and resources.

The people who devote their energies in Synagogue endeavors are, to me, the unsung heroes of Judaism's connection to the past and the sanctity of moral living through the continuing link in the chain of Divine aspirations. To say that this task is awesome would be to understate the nature of leading a congregation in achieving its durability.

I am reminded about a quote attributed to the 11th century poet, Moses Ibn Ezra, who is credited with writing a great many of the Selichot prayers we utter each High Holiday season. The quote I am referring to, which aptly describes the frustrations of congregation leaders: "Pleasing everyone is an impossible aim, and escaping all criticism is an unattainable goal." I am sure those who have chosen to serve know full well the truth of his wisdom.

There are those who will argue that the panacea for the continuation of Jewish thought and pronouncements is not the synagogue but rather adherence to traditions and laws and customs that have become so interwoven that we really can't discern one from the other. To me, the synagogue represents all these things and more.

The synagogue was designed to bring together all forms of religious observance. It was created to deliver a place and time for study and worship that otherwise would not be part of our daily expressions. How many set aside a certain time for prayer or a certain time for learning? Not too many. We are busy with all sorts of issues that require time and money for everyday living. Perhaps there are occasions that draw our attention heavenward, but they are nowhere near the time needed for gratitude and sorrow.

Each denomination in Judaism claims adherents but in reality the actual involvement in a particular synagogue, in most cases, is not related to our religious fervor. We attend a particular synagogue because of past connections or familiarity or location. There are those who profess to follow a certain religious doctrine and are motivated to do so because of strong conviction but they are not the majority but rather a minority.

Judaism without the centrality of the synagogue will not survive. Say what you will about organized religion, its purpose is undeniable and its function undisputed: To maintain that tie that will ensure religious survival. Supporting the synagogue is tantamount to observing all the laws because it leads

you to them. The Temple in Jerusalem was ordained because it was the focal point of all things Holy and all things necessary for life. To hold the value of our synagogues in any less stature is to demean the essence of our heritage.

So here we are – a New Year not only representing the march of time but also marking the belief in creation through the care and concern of nature. And here we are welcoming and encouraging involvement in our religious institutions so that the task necessary for Jewish association will be solidified for the next generation and beyond.

Let us remember that each of us brings to the table of Jewish delights different backgrounds and thoughts and ideals. Some come from traditional backgrounds, some from liberal leanings and some from no involvement at all. However, we all join together to create an atmosphere of caring and commitment to Jewish living. And just as we are different, so is are our understandings of faith. This is our strength, not our weakness.

Perhaps Erich Fromm said it best: “The danger in the past was that men became slaves. The danger of the future is that men may become robots.” Diversity allows us the opportunity to develop and grow, and what better place than in the synagogue in the New Year. This certainly is cause to repeat the words of the “Shehechyanu” prayer and understand it.

1. Session One – October 3, 10, 17 – 1pm – 2:30pm

“Coping with illness, and understanding losses in our lives.” As time moves on we encounter issues that cause us pain, both physically and mentally. Our aches seem to be more frequent. Our friends and family leave us bereft. Together we will explore opportunities to learn how to deal with adversities that affect our quality of life.

2. Session Two – November 7, 14, 21 – 1pm – 2:30pm

“Torah Study.” Learning the various interpretations of Scripture to better understand their meaning for today as they affect our lives. Torah is a living expression of hope, faith and even human failings that are brought together to teach about being human even as we strive to be more. We will explore Torah, the Prophets, and the Talmud to better understand how all of Scripture evolved over time.

Torah Study for October 2017: Sukkot, Shmini Atzeret, Simchat Torah

The primary Torah reading this month concentrates on the Pilgrimage Holiday of Sukkot. Three times a year, Jews from all over the land of Israel and even in the Diaspora were required to make a pilgrimage to the Temple. These Pilgrimage Holidays centered on the harvest time that occurs during those times. The other two Pilgrimages are Passover and Shavuot.

People were required to bring the first of their gatherings as a sacrifice to God to thank Him for the beauty of nature and the abundance of the harvest. In fact, there are special prayers for rain so that each harvest time will produce the necessary food to feed the people. The main industry in Israel during Temple times was agriculture. The commandment found in the Torah (Leviticus 23:34) simply states: “On the fifteenth day of the seventh month there shall be the Feast of Booths to the Lord seven days.” Further in Deuteronomy 16:13 it is written: “After the ingathering from your threshing floor and your vat, you shall hold the Feast of Booths for seven days.”

Eventually Sukkot took on additional significance. A booth was erected near each home called a Sukkah. The significance of the Sukkah was to remind the people of the journey our ancestors took as they began the Exodus from Egypt. They traveled 40 years before arriving at the Promised Land. These booths were their homes during that journey.

Shmini Atzeret literally means the 8th day of the holiday. Again, we read in Leviticus 23:36: “On the eighth day you shall observe a sacred occasion.” Therein lies the answer that so many ask about the eighth day of the holiday. The Yizkor prayers are also recited on Shmini Atzeret. (Yizkor is recited four times a year – Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Passover and Shavuot).

Eventually a ninth day was added observed by Orthodox and Conservative branches of Judaism (Reform celebrate 8 days only), the ninth day (8th in Reform) celebrates the Mitzvah of completing the reading of the Torah cycle. This is commemorated because, to us, the learning process never ends. Learning is a continual event because there is always more to learn and even the things we have learned before hold new significance each time we repeat a sentence, a paragraph, or a chapter.

Therefore, the cycle begins anew – we start with Bereshit (Genesis) and we continue until next year when we start over again. In fact, in some congregations, Consecration Services are held to induct new students into the religious school. It is really a great sight to see the little children marching around the congregation proud of their acceptance into religious education.

It is a fun time of the year. We should really renew our effort to rejoice at these milestones in our lives.

As we look past the High Holidays and focus on the year ahead, the SLJC Congregation has much to be thankful for. We had beautiful High Holidays services led by our Rabbi, Cantor, Music Director, choir and accompanist. Sitting in synagogue listening to the very meaningful words and melodies brings back memories of years past and a new year for SLJC. The sounds of the shofar blown by Harvey Fein were both beautiful, haunting and powerful.

SLJC now begins our events and programming for the year. Adult Education classes led by our Rabbi will begin as noted in the Shpiel. Keep your eyes open, Yiddish classes will be starting in January.

Membership outreach and membership retention are important components to a successful synagogue. At our Friday night service on October 13th our new members will be honored and introduced to the congregation. Preceding the service new members will be invited to a light dinner in the Chapel Center. Invitations will be going out in the first few days of October. Please say hello to our new members at services, invite them to join you in services and at our Oneg Shabbats.

SLJC will hold our annual congregational meeting on Tuesday October 24th at 7:00pm. Please plan on attending this very important meeting. The Nominating Committee will present to the congregation three nominees to the Board of Directors. Additional nominations will be taken from the floor, and according to SLJC Bylaws, the election of Directors will take place. Michael Dar and I will present a report to the congregation on our finances for the time period of September 1, 2016 to August 31, 2017. Additionally, we will discuss what the plans for this year's budget are, and how we plan to keep SLJC on a strong financial footing.

New this year, I am asking all SLJC congregants to submit to me questions they would like answered. At the Congregational meeting I will answer these questions. A written summary of the Q&A will be provided after the meeting. This is an opportunity to get your questions, concerns and ideas brought forward to the SLJC Board. Please remember that all SLJC Board meetings are open to congregants, so please join us whenever you can.

Cantorial Notes: Hakafot (Circles)

After completing my 16th High Holiday season with this amazing congregation, I look toward October which brings our congregation's celebration of Simchat Torah. We mark the end of the previous Torah reading cycle and beginning of the new progression of weekly Torah readings. In traditional settings, you will see dancing and celebrating in the Synagogue, and the Torah is carried around the sanctuary or bimah in 7 circles or Hakafot. We circle seven times because of the importance of the number seven in Jewish tradition, particularly the perfection and completion of creation.



Along with these seven circles, seven songs are traditionally sung. Our congregation will sing the following seven songs (which should be familiar to everyone) during the Hakafot: Am Yisrael Chai, Artzah Alinu, Eileh Chamdah Libi, Heiveinu Shalom Alechem, Lo Yisa Goi, Yism'chu Hashamayim and Oseh Shalom. Because we are rejoicing with the Torah on this holiday, the festivity is enhanced when everyone is singing and celebrating together. So, bring your singing voice, get ready to clap your hands and stomp your feet. The SLJC Hakafot is coming and we want everyone to sing and have fun!
