Yom Kippur - Sukkot, Reflection and Celebration

A simple man once asked a great Sage why there must be both Chassidim and Misnagdim (opponents, referring to Jews of Lithuanian descent who opposed the Chassidic movement).

He remarked that even the Chassidim are divided into many groups: there are those whose service to God is primarily focused on prayer, others who think Torah is the most important aspect of faith, and yet others who believe that joyful expressions serve as a better conduit for spiritual fulfillment. Why are lews so divided?

The Sage responded by comparing this phenomenon to the military, which has different types of personnel: infantry or foot soldiers, cavalry or mounted soldiers, rocket launchers or distant soldiers, sea farers or sailors. The reason is that all types comes to battle featuring their own uniqueness to ensure that the battle will be won. Even the one who sounds the alarm, or the bugler, inspires the soldier or sailor to respond to his or her duty as they were trained.

So, it is with our Jewish people. We are divided into various groups and follow different understandings of faith in our own unique way. However, we all come together with one identity, one common ground. Walk into any synagogue or temple throughout the world and you will find the prayers are the same (although perhaps the melodies are not and the language spoken a little strange), but the words found in the prayer books are in Hebrew, the universal language of Jewish prayer.

Remembering this parable reminded me of our experiences in Sun Lakes. We arrived here from different corners of our country as well as the world at large. We brought with us traditions and customs that may seem strange to some and familiar to others. Yet, when we sit in the pews, we all join in reciting and singing the prayers of our ancestors as has been done since the beginning.

As the High Holidays conclude we should remember our differences but also our similarities. Some will remember the melodies, some the rituals, and others perhaps looked and listened to words and sounds a little differently. It does not matter whether we profess to be Orthodox or Conservative or Reform. It does not even matter whether we claim to be atheistic or humanistic. What does matter is that when we come together, we are all Jews determined to identify and offer our individual uniqueness to our holiday experience.

Then, I think about the next holiday which occurs almost immediately following Yom Kippur - Sukkot. We seem to have forgotten this holiday as it wraps itself into the High Holiday expressions. Yom Kippur gives us the opportunity to review and consider. Sukkot gives us the opportunity to be mindful of the blessings we receive each day, week, month, and year as we continue the journey from contrition to celebration.

When we gather, let us celebrate our individuality. Let us accept the differences in our beliefs. Let us understand that we each contribute in our own way to the greatness of our survival. Let us be at peace.

I pray that Yom Kippur will find us satisfied with our commitment to faith and understanding. I pray that Sukkot will help us understand that the blessings we receive should not be taken for granted. Each, with its own significance, can help us appreciate the beauty of life as it is lived and enjoyed.


DEVORAH HADASSAH

SUKKOT:

GIVING MEANING AND PURPOSE TO OUR LIVES

Sukkot is one of three pilgrimage holidays: a time set aside to reconnect to our roots, a time for coming together to rejoice and give thanks for all that we are and all that we have, and so much more.

Sukkot is different than the other two pilgrimage holidays, Passover and Shavuot. Passover commemorates the concept of freedom. Shavuot acknowledges the purpose of our existence, our religious identity. Sukkot, on the other hand, incorporates the meaning of the other two and adds a significant dimension – Sukkot emphasizes, just as the Sukkah we erect, the tenuousness of our lives, the fragility of our existence and how temporary is our sojourn here.

The holiday is known by several names, my favorite being "Z'man Simhateinu" – a time for celebrating. We have just completed our High Holiday observance and we are satisfied that our expressions of contriteness and our wishes for a better tomorrow have been accepted. It is certainly a cause for joy.

Sukkot enables us to comprehend the true meaning of life: to be thankful for all the harvests of our days. And God is where God should be - in our hearts and minds, in our deeds and actions, in our relationships and understanding of each other.

Our Sages attempted to illustrate how futile it is to think only of ourselves with the story of a man sitting in a boat filled with many people. Suddenly the man began drilling a hole under his seat. The other passengers were outraged

and admonished him for doing something so foolhardy. His reply was that he was only drilling the hole under his seat and could not understand the commotion. Everyone exclaimed that if he continued to drill the hole the boat would fill with water, and everyone would drown. We are responsible to others for our actions and for the consequences that will result. We are responsible to God for those things that relate to our spiritual well-being. We are responsible to ourselves to ensure that our lives will have meaning and purpose.

Our lives are tenuous, our existence indeed fragile and the gift of life so temporary that we must take the time to celebrate, rejoice and give thanks. Then the ultimate blessing of the season – Sukkat Shalom – peace in our homes (which translates into peace in our lives), will be our reward.

Sukkot this year begins the evening of Sunday, October 9 and lasts seven days (eight in the Orthodox and Conservative observances). It culminates with the added holiday of Simchat Torah - the rejoicing of the Torah the annual completion of reading the entire five Books and beginning again. It is also a time to remember all who have passed and fulfill our obligation to light a yahrzeit candle in their memory. Yizkor is recited in the synagogue - one of the four times a year we recite this prayer (Shavuot, Passover, Sukkot and Yom Kippur).

2022 Hanukkah Greetings Project for Lone Soldiers

The SLJC Men's Club will hold a meeting Tuesday, October 11 in the Chapel Center at 6:30 pm for socializing and a 7 pm start time.

The following Men's Club's meeting will be on November 1 at 6:30 pm in the Chapel Center. The speakers will be a Lone Soldier Veteran and Michael Cohen. Spouses are invited.

Chris Stanford will discuss his motivation for and gratification of being a Lone Soldier in the IDF. He will also share some of the obstacles and stresses Lone Soldiers experience as they defend and protect Israel. Following a Q & A, attendees will be asked to write brief Hannukah Greeting letters to Lone Soldiers.

Chris was raised in Arizona by a father who had a very strong connection to Israel. At age 18, Chris arrived at Kibbutz Geva to experience life in Israel. At his request, his work visa was extended through the Lebanon War so he could be sure that the kibbutz's work could be sustained. In 2009 Chris made Aliyah and joined the IDF 2 months later, ultimately becoming a member of the infamous Flying Tigers Special Operation Reconnaissance Unit.

SOMETHING YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW **EYDIE GORME & STEVE LAWRENCE**

Think back to the 1960s. Do you remember listening to the songs of Sidney Leibowitz and Edith Gormezano? They each had several top ten hits and appeared regularly on television. Both decided to become professional singers and were hired to appear as regulars on the Tonight Show with Steve Allen in 1954. They met, fell in love, and were married in 1957, a marriage which lasted until her death in 2013. It should be mentioned that the Gormezanos were a Sephardic family who immigrated from Turkey.

With promising careers, they each felt a name change was justified. Sidney took the names of his two nephews and became Steve Lawrence. Edith was changed to Eydie and Gormezano was shortened to Gorme. Now you remember the music of Steve and Eydie. Steve had hits with "Pretty Blue Eyes," "Footsteps," Portrait of My Love," and "Go Away Little Girl." The biggest hit for either member of this talented couple was Eydie's "Blame It on the Bossa Nova," which topped the charts in 1963.



Eydie retired for health reasons in 2009 and Steve continued a solo career. After her death, Steve not only lamented her passing but indicated that he missed her exceptional talent.

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

Jennifer Gerwarges, U. S. Vets -Phoenix, Program Director, will be the speaker at the Jewish War Veterans, Copper State Post 619 on Sunday, October18.

Jennifer is excited about U.S. Vets' newest housing project, Ashley Place, opening November 1. The project, consisting of two houses holding five women each, will provide a safe and sober living environment where women with children can receive treatment for sexual trauma, substance misuse, work re-entry counseling, and assistance in receiving disability payments. Ashley Place will support the female veterans working towards employment and permanent housing. Ashely Place was gifted by the Milanovich Trust in collaboration with the Habitat for Humanity.

To support this new venture, those attending JWV's meeting are encouraged to bring hygiene products for the Ashley House women. Shampoo, conditioner, body soap, razors, shaving lotion, comb, brush, toothbrush, toothpaste, pads, deodorant, facial cleanser and lotions, hair ties would be most welcomed.

Jennifer received her master's degree in Social Work from Arizona State University. Before coming to U.S. VETS, she worked at Southwest Key Programs, a non-profit organization dedicated to reunifying and sheltering immigrant children and families escaping dangerous conditions in their countries of origin. As Victim's Advocate for the Phoenix Fire Department, Jennifer assisted victims of domestic and sexual violence, human trafficking, and child abuse in reaching safety.

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
